Stocksfield Parish Council Chair's Annual Report

May 2022 – April 2023

After being co-opted on to the Parish Council in September 2021, I was surprised and delighted to be asked by my fellow councillors to take over as Chair in May 2022, following Maggi Hunt's retirement.

I have done my best to maintain the high standards set by my predecessor, and hope that as a Council we have done much to maintain the quality of life here in Stocksfield.

The Council has continued to meet on first Tuesday evening of each month in the main hall at the Community Centre where we have maintained social distancing for members, and the public. From the April 2023 meeting we have reverted to meeting on the first Monday in the Richardson Room.

Meetings of the Advisory Groups have taken place remotely until April 2023 since when we have reverted to face-to-face meetings.

Minutes of Council Meetings, all policy documents, and a monthly financial report are all published on our website and are posted on the Council's notice boards.

Councillors Lindsey Joy and Jack Lapping both resigned from the Council mid-2022 and despite strenuous efforts we have been unable to secure replacements. Out of a potential complement of 12 members we currently have 8 active councillors.

The Council continues to implement and develop a Climate Change Action Plan, and all our activities are underpinned by this ethos.

In November 2022 we held our annual Remembrance Day Parade at the War Memorial. As always, this was a well-attended event bringing together many generations of residents. Thanks are due to Councillor Tim Hills for providing the

PA system, and to Parish Clerk Nick Spencer who managed the event. Wreaths were laid by representatives of the Lord Lieutenant's Office (Fiona Lees-Millais), the Parish Council, The County Council, various guiding and scouting organisations, and the local police. Unfortunately, the Army Battalion from Albemarle Barracks had been deployed on active service shortly before the event and could not attend this year. The Service was ably led by Reader Jane Agar in her first duty since being licenced. Closure of the A695 was well managed by staff from Northumberland County Council, and finally thanks must go to the Guides who provided tea, coffee, and biscuits in the Community Centre after the Service.

The environs of the village are wonderfully maintained by our Ground Services Contractor Martin Stewart and his team. They look after the floral displays and planters, both children's play areas, the magnificent Christmas Tree displays, and the many tasks required throughout the year in terms of maintenance.

We have a network of defibrillators under the Stewardship of the Parish Clerk, and this network covers almost every house in the village.

We have published two editions of NE43 NEWS delivered to every house in the village keeping residents up to date with happenings in their area.

We have also made grants and donations to many local organisations.

There were two Royal events which evoked extremes of joy and sadness: In June we celebrated HM The Queen's Platinum Jubilee with activities throughout the village, but we were saddened by her death in September.

The day-to-day work of the Council has been managed by our Parish Clerk, Nick Spencer. I am personally grateful for the help and advice he has given me in my time on the Council and I am sure my fellow Councillors echo those thanks. Nick retired on 3 I May, but with untaken leave, his last day in post was 5 May, and we send him our best wishes for a long and happy retirement. We are fortunate to have Lucy Guthrie joining us as our Parish Clerk from 24 April giving her a short handover period with Nick.

Finally, my thanks to my fellow councillors for their help and support during this past 12 months.

ANNUAL AUDIT

Each year the Council's accounts and financial arrangements are subject to an audit by an independent auditor who reports their findings to the Council. The accounts for 2022/23 have been examined and reported to the June meeting of the Council where members were satisfied that no action needs to be taken as a consequence of the report.

The Council also submits an annual report (known as the Annual Governance and Accountability Return) to external auditors and the outcome of this assessment will be known later in the year. Information provided to the external auditors will be available on the Council's website and on the main notice board opposite the railway station car park. The rights of residents to examine the accounting records, to question the external auditor and to make objections to audit will also be explained.

VACANCIES

It is a great time to get involved! Stocksfield Parish Council currently has vacancies for new members to join our team and share your skills and enthusiasm with the community. We are looking for members who have a passion for our community and are willing to help by creating or supporting local projects and initiatives.

Why do we have Parish Councils?

Parish Councils are an essential part of the structure of local democracy and have a vital role in acting on behalf of the communities they represent. They:

- give views, on behalf of the community, on planning applications and other proposals that affect the parish
- undertake projects and schemes that benefit local residents
- work in partnership with other local organisations and public bodies to achieve benefits for the parish
- alert relevant authorities to problems that arise or work that needs to be undertaken
- help the other tiers of local government keep in touch with their local communities.

What does Stocksfield Parish Council do for me?

We're here to support the people of Stocksfield parish through the provision and improvement of services and facilities, for example we:

- own and manage the sports fields and multisports area for the benefit of all users
- own and manage the Kates Plain and Branch End Play Areas and outdoor gym
- have introduced new schemes to benefit residents, such as the defibrillators located through the parish, which we also maintain and manage
- produce and distribute NE43 News magazine twice a year, keeping residents connected with community news and events
- maintain the public seats, footpaths and gardens of the Parish
- award grants that benefit residents of the Parish
- support community events such as Remembrance Day Service.

Will it take up all my time?!

No! All of our members are volunteers with a passion for the community. The Parish Council meets once a month (except in August) to run through parish business and make decisions. It is supported by its Clerk

who delivers much of the day to day business for the council such as preparing the paperwork and agenda for each meeting, acting as responsible financial officer and providing advice to the members as necessary. For those who are interested in specific issues, we have advisory groups for Communications, Planning, Rights of Way & Environment and General Governance which members are welcome to join.

How can I find out more?

If you'd like to find out more about being a Parish Councillor, please contact our Parish Clerk Lucy Guthrie at clerk@stocksfieldpc.org.uk Lucy can also put you in touch with current Parish Councillors if you would like an informal chat about the role.

Please note: There are currently four vacancies for councillors which are able to be filled by co-option. The Council's co-option policy is on its website. In order to apply, you must be at least 18 years of age and qualify by meeting one of the following criteria:

- you are on the register of electors
- you are an owner or tenant of land or property within the Council's area
- your main or only place of work during the preceding 12 months has been in the Council's area; or
- you have resided in the Council's area for at least 12 months or within three miles of it.

Stocksfield Flood Wardens Needed

The Parish Council and the Environment Agency are calling on local people to play their part in Stocksfield by registering to volunteer as a Flood Warden.

Flood Wardens are the eyes and ears on the ground, they act as a link between the Environment Agency and communities at risk - getting vital information out to local residents.

The community has a flood contingency plan in the form of the Stocksfield Community Flood Plan, but needs new people to volunteer their time to ensure that the plan can be used effectively in the event of a flood. This is not a time consuming role, only requiring your support when flooding is possible and to ensure the plan remains up to date.

Flood Warden Groups exist throughout the country and help ensure the Environment Agency's flood warning messages reach the local community and are acted upon. North East Wardens have a direct line through to the Environment Agency's Area Incident Room in Newcastle.

Outside of a flood event, they can help raise awareness of flooding issues in the local community, encourage people to register to receive free flood warnings and provide information to partners about vulnerable people or properties in the flood plain.

The Environment Agency and Northumberland County Council are urging people to think about how they can reduce their risk of flooding. Flooding is no longer only an issue for communities living near to rivers or the sea, as surface water flooding can now pose as much risk.

The impact of climate change now means that many areas are potentially at risk of flooding due to heavy downpours putting pressure on existing drainage.

Being flooded is absolutely devastating and any steps that can be taken towards better protecting your property, business and community can significantly lessen the impact. Some ways that you can increase your resilience to flooding are:



Check your flood risk from rivers, sea and surface water on the flood warning information service flood maps by visiting - https://www.gov.uk/check-flooding or scan the QR code.

Sign up to the Flood Warning Service to receive free flood warning messages by visiting - https://www.gov.uk/sign-up-for-flood-warnings or scan the QR code.





Create a Personal Flood Plan and pack a grab bag with essentials

UPDATE from County Councillor Anne Dale June 2023

It seems to be a long time since I last wrote in the NE43 news. In fact it was just before Christmas last year. It was great that the village went back into full Christmas mode again with parties, school nativity plays, carol singing around the doors and Carol services.

Last year we celebrated the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee and then later mourned her sad death. At the beginning of June this year the village celebrated the coronation of our new King, Charles III and Queen Camilla. Thank you everyone who kindly helped and supported the weekend.

The work on the highways in the village has continued apace whether it be Northern Gas, Northumbrian Water, the County Council or the roll-out of full fibre broadband. The delivery of full fibre to households has been more difficult that was first envisaged as the original BT ducts in some sections have had to be renewed. It is being rolled out in sections and you will be contacted when they reach your section. The delivery of the contract has not been without its problems but the County Council and I work with the company to ensure work continues as quickly as possible. If you would like further information do contact me.

The County Council continues to face challenging times. I am sure that with the appointment of Dr. Helen Paterson as the new Chief Executive improvements will start to take place. Again the budget made further cuts to services despite a rise in Council tax. There is also a shortage of staff in some sectors such as Social Services which is putting a strain on the delivery of services. The maintenance of our highways continues to be a concern and more financial resources are required to help the staff to do the necessary work. I take an active part in Committee work including the independent Committee. If you would like to discuss any of my work in more detail please do contact me.

I am always delighted to contribute to any capital projects in the village from my Members Small Scheme allowance – for example the tennis club and cricket club and there are other projects in hand too.


John Harris (who maintains the website) said 'There is so much walking information on the web but it is difficult to find. Walking in Northumberland (part of the Walking in England website) has

Friendly Fridays arose from the Dementia Friendly Communities of the Alzheimer's Society (the scheme closed this year). In 2017 a small committee organised events to raise awareness of dementia, the Quaker Meeting House became involved and offered their premises at Branch End and so Friendly Fridays began. We quickly found that people living on their own, whether or not they had dementia, welcomed somewhere local to go for company.

After Covid, the advantages of easy parking, freshly made tea, coffee and cakes and a larger room at Cafe 7nn made a change of venue desirable. We have met there for almost two years now. One or two who attend are living with dementia, but most just value the opportunity to get out of the house and meet people. There is no programme, we just enjoy the chat. It is all very relaxed and friendly.

It will be in its usual place - the playing fields adjacent to the Stocksfield Cricket Club.

After a gap of four years (yes really, four years!) it should be a brilliant day and a chance for everyone to come together, meet up with friends and soak up the atmosphere. And all on your doorstep!

What's it all about?

The festival was launched in 2009 with the aim of bringing the community together and celebrating all that's special about Stocksfield and its surrounding areas. This year's festival will follow tradition and lots of local organisations have signed up, including Stocksfield Football Club and Tennis Club, Stocksfield Plants and Gardens Society as well as Broomley Grange and the Friends of Broomley Woods.

This year will also see a number of environmental groups taking part as well at Broomley First School PTA and Stocksfield Scouts.

Who will be there?

The festival will be open from 11-4pm and there'll be live music all day with a brilliant line up of local bands and musicians. As well entertainment there will be a bar, stalls selling crafts, food and other hand-made goods; an exciting array of food vendors as well as a refreshment marquee providing teas and coffees and a place to sit, chat and chill!

What is there for kids to do?

Children will be well catered for — with arts and crafts activities, storytelling, a bouncy castle and the chance to have a go at archery courtesy of the Tynedale Archers. Thanks to a grant from the Ballinger Trust and National Lottery, the committee have also been able to secure funding for a climbing wall and, for the first time at the Festival, a bungee trampoline!
