
Stocksfield Parish Council Declares a Climate Emergency

At the Council meeting on 14 July 2021, members of the Council resolved to declare a Climate Emergency and form a Climate Change Emergency Advisory Group. The Group will consist of at least three Parish Councillors and at present includes Colin Chance (who chairs the group and pictured right), Anne Dale (also County Councillor) and Lindsey loy.

The group will seek to include volunteers and experts to help identify and then take forward agreed initiatives and will work with residents, businesses, organisations, charities, and land owners for the benefit of Stocksfield.

Colin has also been appointed Northumberland County Council Community Climate Change Champion for Stocksfield and this will link the Parish Council with the County Council, Climate Change Team.

Since July the Advisory Group has met on a number of occasions and volunteers have already joined including representatives

It is the Council's intention to run a Climate Change community event early next year to obtain information on what YOU think could be done locally to deal with the causes of climate change and improving our environment.

Coronavirus (Covid 19)

The impact of the Covid-19 pandemic continues to be felt by us all and by some more than others. The thoughts of us all are with those who have lost loved ones through the illness. Many more have struggled through serious illness themselves and others continue to fight long-Covid. Despite the success of the country's vaccination programme, the government recognises the need for caution amongst us all. As the infection levels vary locally and across the country, providing specific advice four weeks prior to publication of NE43 News would be foolish but there is no doubt it will remain

a serious health risk over the coming months. Northumberland County Council (NCC) provides very detailed information on a county ward basis, showing the levels of infections, on its website. Although actual numbers of infections can appear low within the ward (which covers Stocksfield, Mickley and Riding Mill), the level per 100,000 residents provides comparative data. The latest government advice regarding Covid-19 booster and flu vaccinations can be found on its website:

The Council has adapted to the risk of

infections from Covid-19. For the time being, full Council meetings are held in the hall at the Community Centre which enables those attending to be distanced sufficiently and for members of the public to attend. The schedule of meetings is shown on the rear page. The Council's normal meetings must be held in person to comply with the law although its other meetings are held remotely. The Council's office is closed to visitors but the Clerk can be contacted by telephone or email.

Looking after Stocksfield BINS HEDGES & BALSAM

There are always one or two things that make it into NE43 News on a regular basis and the Council receives complaints throughout most years about some of them. Garden hedges not being trimmed so that they encroach into footpaths or roads is one such matter – particularly on the Painshawfield Estate where footpaths and roads are very narrow.

Northumberland County Council (NCC) empty the litter bins around the village on a weekly basis but certain bins have tended to fill more quickly than usual since the Covid pandemic. If you see a litter bin that is full, please telephone the number on the bin (0345 600 6400) and NCC will arrange for it to be emptied.

Invasive plants are probably not high on the list of concerns for most residents. There are real issues where Himalayan balsam (pictured) is allowed to grow unchecked around watercourses. The plants overcome the natural vegetation but, after seeding, die to leave the banks of watercourses unstable and susceptible to flood or storm damage. Additionally the seeds are then carried downstream where they cause further damage. June is the best time to deal with balsam before the seeds can ripen. They spread by explosion and can carry for 7m without any help from water! The Council's Rights of Way Group are very active in trying to eradicate balsam from Stocksfield Burn and are always willing to advise if you think you may have the plant on your land - just contact the Council Clerk in the first instance.

Stocksfield Flood WardensCan you Help?

The Parish Council and the Environment Agency (EA) are looking for local people to play their part in Stocksfield by registering to volunteer as a flood warden and supplement the Council's existing two wardens. Flood wardens are the eyes and ears on the ground, they act as a link between the EA and communities at risk - getting vital information out to local residents.

The community already has a contingency plan in place in the form of the Stocksfield Community Flood Plan, but needs new people to volunteer their time to ensure that the plan can be used effectively in the event of a flash flood. This is not a time-consuming role, only requiring your support when flooding is possible and to ensure the plan remains up to date.

Flood Warden Groups exist throughout the country and help ensure the EA's flood warning messages reach the local community and are acted upon. North East wardens have a direct line through to the EA's Area Incident Room in Newcastle.

Outside of a flood event, they can help raise awareness of flooding issues in the local community, encourage people to register to receive free flood warnings and provide information to partners about vulnerable people or properties in the flood plain.

We welcome new ideas and ways of working that could further enhance the excellent work that

has already been done over the years.

GRANTS

During the Covid-19 restrictions, the Parish Council received grant funding from Central Government and decided to make it available to local groups who were able to apply for up to £2,000. The last edition of NE43 News included updates from a number of grant recipients about how the funds had been used. This edition has more information on this and following pages providing updates from other organisations.

Whilst the sums available during and immediately after the Covid restrictions were a one-off, the Council awards grants each year and welcomes applications from local groups. Applications for grants of up to £500 can be made now although grants of more than £500 require early application before the Council's budget is set in the preceding financial year. Full details can be found in the Council's grant policy on its website with applications forms.

Singing Mamas Support Space a Success!

Thanks to a grant from Stocksfield Parish Council's Coronavirus Support Fund, Singing Mamas Choir CIC ran a successful 'Support Space' project over the summer which hugely benefited fifteen women (mothers and non-mothers of all ages) from Stocksfield and surrounding areas.

Over a six-week period, the women (some of whom brought their little ones along too) came together to connect through singing, engage in mindfulness activities and socialise. Tea and cake was also an important part of the session! The project was underpinned by the enormous amount of evidence which supports the simple act of singing as a means to improve your mental and physical health, and featured the NHS Five Steps to Mental Well-being. By the end of the project, all of the women commented on how much they enjoyed the songs and creating gorgeous harmonies with their voices, and reported an overall improvement to their mental health and well-being.

One mum said "I was feeling in a total slump this week but I feel so much better after some breathing and singing... I loved



St John's garden

At the beginning of 2021 and in the throes of Covid 19, a germ of an idea, to make a peaceful garden space where people could sit and enjoy their surroundings, began. Initially, this was to be self-funded under the expert gardening advice of Helen Taylor, a local lady.

Planning meetings were held and garden plans discussed. At this point, Bill Martin suggested we should apply to Stocksfield Parish Council for a grant. The process was very straight forward and by spring we had our grant of £2000. What a difference this made to the planning and execution and what a wonderful memory of Bill. Since then, the garden has flourished. We ordered plants and shrubs



and topsoil. The addition of three garden seats, allowing people to stop and sit quietly, is thanks to the grant given to us.

So, what have we done? We held a memorial service for those affected by Covid; had open air services when inside services were not possible; had a cream tea celebration and our local Keep Fit and Yoga groups have used this outside space. It is with great joy that we watch people in our community popping into the garden. It does not matter how long they spend in this garden space, they know it is there for everyone to enjoy.

Thank you for helping us to make our initial idea come to fruition.

Singing Mamas initiated the project because (as reported by the Maternal Mental Health Alliance) pregnant women and new mothers form one of the groups that have been most adversely affected by the Covid pandemic when it comes to a decline in their mental health and wellbeing. Mothers have reported feeling

lonely, disconnected and without access to an informal support network on which they would usually rely so much. Singing Mamas understands this perfectly and is a national movement for maternal wellbeing made up of nurses, doctors, midwives, musicians, teachers and community workers who are all committed to improving the wellbeing of women through singing.








KEEP THE DATE

Many of us are really concerned about the current quantity and quality of volume house-building in our region. Our members tell us this over and over again. But speaking up on the issue is, frustratingly, sometimes dismissed as mere NIMBYism. Because it's very easy to say what we don't like, but much harder to define what we do, how can we differentiate great housing from mediocre tick-box schemes?

We decided we might be able to help on this one, making out a positive case for well-designed housing that provides a range of affordable homes for local people, and is kind to the environment.

CPRE Northumberland's new campaign sets out to do just this. "It's something we see all the time", explained Branch Coordinator Annie Lloyd. "New rural housing applications so often have design

Stocksfield's very own

ULTRAMARATHON

One very hot Saturday morning in early June, 56 runners, including a few well-known local names, descended on Wheelbirks Farm to run the Cow Shed Back Yard Ultra, held entirely within the farm boundary. Stocksfield's own ultra! Back yard ultras involve running a course of 4.167 miles within an hour. Exactly one hour after the 10am start, all runners need to

be back in the starting pen for the bell that signals the off for lap two. If you don't make it back in time, you are disqualified. So go off too fast and you could be waiting a while at the start of the next lap but go too slow and you're a DNF (a hated



acronym amongst athletes for 'did not finish'). Easy you might think, but on an off-road course with 450 feet of ascent on each lap, the knowledge that the only finisher will be the runner who completes a lap that nobody else has, and that you could be running for a while, it is a bit of a challenge.



And why a 4.167 miles course? If you manage to complete 24 laps (or yards as they are referred to), then you've run 100 miles.

The heat took its toll early on, but ten hours and ten 'yards' later there were still 25 runners, if not all going strong, they were all still going. Darkness saw further withdrawals and at 2pm the following day, only two runners reached the start of lap 28. An hour later and James Osborn, from Durham Fell Runners, was waiting at the start line for the 29th 'yard'. He was joined shortly by Paul Brunger, the only other person still in the race. Just after the bell sounded to start the lap, and both runners having crossed the start line, Paul stopped, shook James by the hand and then withdrew. James now had to complete one more lap or he too would be a DNF. After 29 hours and over 120 miles, James crossed the line to cheers and to receive his trophy.

If you fancy giving an ultramarathon a go and don't want to leave Stocksfield, the next Wheelbirks Cow Shed Back Yard Ultra is on 16 April 2022! For details see the website - https://greenermilesrunning.co.uk/



Exploring the ingredients of good new rural housing

limitations that we know could easily be improved upon, to the benefit of the community, the environment, and residents' wellbeing. We want to input more constructively, setting out what we feel are the ingredients of really great housing design."

So, throughout the Autumn, the campaign is examining one theme a week, based upon the I2 principles in the 'Building for a Healthy Life' toolkit produced by Homes England and the NHS. The group aim to engage public debate and facilitate more 'design literacy'. "There are some really exciting concepts out there", explained Annie. "If people knew a little more about them, they could demand better from housebuilders — as buyers, renters, as Parish Councillors, voters or just individuals feeling powerless about developments on their doorstep."

Most of us understand that more housing is needed, but this provision must prioritise need, location, people and the planet, over pure profit. Poor quality, volume housebuilding is strangling our towns and villages in a chokehold of ugly 'anywhere' standard house types, in schemes led by distant developers rather than by local communities themselves.

Housing must meet identified need, not developer demand. We could be using tax to incentivise brownfield re-use and to discourage greenbelt proposals, empty homes, second homes and holiday rentals. We could rename affordable housing as appropriate housing to dissolve away stigma. We could be preventing landbanking by specifying a finite completion date for developments. And so much more.

We want to keep our green open spaces as just that – the stunning countryside that

we all value for its natural peace and beauty. But where new housing does need to be provided, it is perfectly possible to build sensitive, well-designed, vibrant places with built-in qualities like sustainability, biodiversity, active transport, connectivity, green and blue infrastructure. And at their very core, a quality called 'good placemaking'. Developments need well-connected, attractive layouts that encourage people out of their cars, in favour of active, healthy and climate-conscious transport choices.

Broomley First School Democracy Day

On Tuesday 2nd November 2021 County Councillor Anne Dale visited us at Broomley First School to celebrate Democracy Day.

All the children in school took part in an assembly to discuss democracy and what this means to them. We have been totally overwhelmed by the response of the children from Reception to Y4 in how they think we can make choices that will help the world be a much better place, for instance the use of giant hamster wheels to make electricity, and the need to switch off lights and white board projectors when not in use.

It soon became evident that the school's driving force was a desire to work on making our local environment a healthier and greener space, planting not just trees but pollinator plants to encourage insects, birds and mammals; growing vegetables in the garden which can be used by Mr Brenan, our wonderful cook; reducing landfill and waste by recycling and using less plastic. The children are keen to begin their Eco Journey with the launch of the Stocksfield Garbage Crew with Anne Dale, so watch this space...!

The whole school has been inspired to look at how we use energy and how we make democratic choices through the School Council and the Eco School Team (soon to be elected).

Worried about your energy supplies?

Does this summarise your concerns?

"My energy supplier recently went under and the new tariff I've been put on is far more than I used to pay. I've heard energy prices are set to rise further and I'm just not sure I can afford it. What help can I get or small changes can I make around my house to help save some money this winter?"



Hear what Citizens Advice has to say:-

The cost of energy is very high at the moment and it's causing many people to worry. Normally we would suggest switching to a better deal, but the situation is very difficult at the moment and there aren't a lot of good deals out there. However, there are still other small ways you can keep your bills down.

Little everyday things can help, such as making sure televisions and other electronic devices are switched off and not left on standby; washing clothes on a lower temperature; and only filling the kettle with the water you need.

Turning down your main thermostat by I degree can save you around $\pounds60$ on your energy bill. And by spending one minute less in the shower each day, a family of four could save $\pounds75$ a year on energy and water bills. The Government's Simple Energy Advice website has more tips like this.

You're right in another way about bills going through the roof - and the walls. One way of cutting costs in the long-run is to invest in good insulation if you can afford to. If you're renting, ask your landlord to do this.

You may be able to get financial support to help insulate your home under the Energy Company Obligation scheme. Contact your energy supplier for more information. If you're in a household that's not connected to the gas grid you may also be able to receive help under the Home Upgrade Grant scheme through your local authority.

There's some financial support available for paying your energy bills, depending on your situation. For example, if you're a pensioner with a low income or receive Universal Credit or other means-tested benefits, you may be entitled to the Warm Home Discount. This gives you £140 a year to go towards your bills. Check the

Government website to find out if you can claim it.

The Government recently announced a £500m fund to support households this winter so keep a look out for announcements about how this could help you. In England, it will be distributed by Local Authorities. In Wales, it will be decided by the Government.
