The END of an Era...



At the Council's Annual Meeting on 10 May 2022, after almost twelve years as a parish councillor and nearly ten as the Council's Chair, Maggi Hunt performed her final duty as Chair – to oversee the election of her replacement as Chair. Maggi then formally stepped down as a parish councillor and thanked everyone for their support during her time as Chair.

The Council's Vice Chair, Paul Vickers, thanked Maggi for the many years of hard work, much of it unseen by residents and councillors alike. He presented Maggi with flowers and a gift token in recognition of the significant contribution Maggi had made to Stocksfield in her time on the Council. Councillors gave their best wishes to Maggi who then left the meeting.

John Harrison, who had been co-opted to the Council in September 2021, was elected as Chair for 2022/23 with Paul Vickers remaining as Vice Chair.

Stocksfield Parish Council Chair's Annual Report

May 2021 – April 2022

In another challenging year for the Parish Council, we have done our best to maintain high standards and continue to offer our residents excellent value for money. In line with national legislation, full Parish Council meetings have taken place face-to-face since May 2021, albeit in a different venue and on a different day, and we have ensured access to those meetings for members of the public, with clear risk assessment measures in place. Meetings of Advisory Groups have been held remotely, enabling us to remain up-to-date and well informed despite the various restrictions with which we have needed to operate.



The composition of the Parish Council has changed somewhat during the year. Two of our longstanding members, Judith Furniss and Dennis Parke, left the Council at the beginning of May 2021, just before the local Council elections. We are very grateful to both of them for their valuable contribution to a number of Council activities and developments and wish them well. Colin Chance was first co-opted and then newly elected to the Council in May, along with County Councillor Anne Dale, who has been a parish councillor previously. The remaining three places were filled in September when Amy Brooks, John Harrison and Jack Lapping were co-opted as councillors. We are lucky here in Stocksfield to have so many talented and experienced residents who are willing to devote their time to the Council's work.

In July 2021, in line with Northumberland County Council, the Parish Council declared a Climate Change Emergency

and established a new Climate Change Emergency Advisory Group, consisting of three councillors and convened by Colin Chance. Since then, a number of members of the local community have joined the Group, and reports from its meetings have been brought to Parish Council meetings. However, with the resignation of Colin Chance from the Council in March 2022, the Group, now known as Stocksfield Climate Change Group, has become freestanding and is working alongside Stocksfield Community Association. The future development of the Parish Council's Climate Change Emergency Advisory Group is currently under discussion, and the Council will continue to ensure that its policies and practices take account of climate change and related implications. We look forward to seeing the activities of the new Group making a difference to the carbon footprint of our village.



We were very relieved that, by November 2021 Covid restrictions and infection rates were such that we were able to hold the Remembrance Service once again at the War Memorial. Thanks to the sterling efforts of Councillor Tim Hills and Nick Spencer, the Parish Council Clerk, the non-appearance of the sound system was quickly and efficiently dealt with, and proceedings went ahead smoothly. The large number of residents who attended were treated to the sight of a procession of Army personnel and local Scouting and Guiding groups, due to the temporary closure of the A695, and the Service was ably and movingly led by Rev. Dr Pat Moran. As always, this was a truly multi-generational community occasion, and I would like to pass on my sincere thanks to everyone who made it possible.

Despite the range of restrictions and safety measures we have all been living with, the day-to-day work of the Council has

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continued throughout the year, making a significant contribution to the quality of all our lives. The enthusiasm and commitment of our Grounds Services contractor, Martin Stewart, are evident all around us, in the beautiful Spring flower displays, our two lovely play areas, the sparkling Christmas tree throughout December, and the general high quality of cleanliness and safety which we enjoy. Our network of public access defibrillators, under the guardianship of the Parish Council Clerk, has offered potentially life-saving support to almost all dwelling houses within our area. Advisory Groups and individual councillors have reviewed the community flood plan, supported Stocksfield Cricket Club's plans to develop and extend the Cricket clubhouse, arranged for Broomley First School pupils to use part of the sports field for outdoor education, and granted permission for Prudhoe Community High School pupils to enjoy their end-of-year prom at Stocksfield Cricket Club when their original venue



was unable to accommodate them due to circumstances linked to the Covid virus. In addition, planning applications have been considered, and matters raised by the Rights of Way and Environment Group, such as the eradication of Himalayan balsam near our local waterways, have been acted upon. We also published two editions of NE43 News, our popular newsletter, in June and December 2021.

During the year, the Parish Council has made grants to Hindley St Margaret's Burial Board, Broomley Parent Teacher Association, Friends of Stocksfield Community Woodland, and the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebration in support of projects which benefit a wide range of our community members. We have also made donations to a number of local charities, and passed on a Government-funded Covid-19 Restart grant to the Multi Use Games Area.

Underpinning everything that we do, of course, is the work of Nick Spencer, our Parish Council Clerk, whose resourcefulness, resilience and capacity for problem-solving have been even more vital than ever since the beginning of the pandemic. I am very grateful to him for the considerable commitment he demonstrates to the Council and to those who live in the area it covers. My sincere thanks also go to Martin Stewart, the Council's longstanding Grounds Services contractor, whose hard work and dedication make our village such a lovely place in which to live and work.

After almost twelve years as a councillor, ten of them in the role of Chair, I will be stepping down from the Council at the Annual Meeting in May. It has been an enormous privilege to represent my community, and I am proud of what the Council has achieved over the years. In general, whatever their political beliefs, councillors put aside their differences, and focus their efforts on achieving the best outcome for residents, treating one another with respect and courtesy. I would like to extend my thanks and appreciation to them, and to wish them well for the future.

VACANCIES

This newsletter has, over the years, included articles which have sought to demonstrate the range of activities and services for which the Council is responsible. Without the voluntary work of residents who are prepared to be parish councillors, the day-to-day functions of the Council, and therefore the services it runs, could not occur.

There are currently two vacancies for councillors which can now be filled by co-option. If you are interested in becoming a parish councillor, please get in touch with the Chair or Clerk for further information. The Council's co-option policy is on its website and the full Council meets monthly (except in August) on the first Tuesday of each month.

In order to apply, you must be at least 18 years of age and qualify by meeting one of the following criteria:

- you are on the register of electors
- you are an owner or tenant of land or property within the Council's area
- your main or only place of work during the preceding 12 months has been in the Council's area or
- you have resided in the Council's area for at least 12 months or within three miles of it.

ANNUAL audit

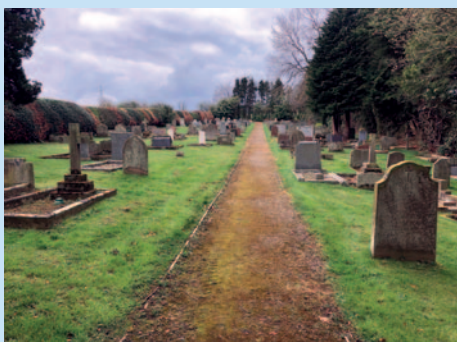
Each year the Council's accounts and financial arrangements are subject to an audit by an independent auditor who reports their findings to the Council. The accounts for 2021/22 have been examined and reported to the May meeting of the Council where members were satisfied that no action needs to be taken because of the report.

The Council also submits an annual report (known as the Annual Governance and Accountability Return) to external auditors and the outcome of this assessment will be known in September. Information provided to the external auditors will be available on the Council's website and on the main notice board opposite the railway station car park. The rights of residents to examine the accounting records, to question the external auditor and to make objections to audit will also be explained.

Hindley Cemetery

In 2021 the Parish Council made a significant grant award to Hindley St Margaret's Burial Board as a contribution towards the repairs to the footpaths running across the cemetery. Rita Marrison, the secretary of St Margaret's Hindley Burial Board has supplied photographs (see images right) showing the transformation and thanked the Parish Council for its part-funding of the project. The Council has also made annual grants to the Burial Board in recent years which have supported the running of the cemetery, particularly during the Covid pandemic.

If you are a part of a local group, your group may be eligible to apply for a grant from the Council. Grants of up to £500 can be made during the year but if you are considering applying for more than £500, the application needs to be made in the preceding financial year (so that the Council can budget accordingly). Full details can be found in the Council's Grants Policy on its website.



SCOUT POST

Thank you to everyone who supported our 20th year of 'Scout Post'. There was a noticeable reduction in the number of Christmas cards exchanged, but it still provides an opportunity to help the residents who use the service provided by the Scouts, Cubs and Beavers. The contributions donated amounted to £291.70, which highlights the generosity of the users - for which we are most grateful. With the addition of Gift Aid, which can now be raised on all the donations received, the final total was £350. This is not only a great contribution towards the Scout Hut, but equally important, raises the profile of Scouting in Stocksfield.

Shops are particularly busy in the run-up to Christmas and the venture would not be possible without the annual support from the two Post Offices and the Chemist who provide space to accommodate the Scout Post boxes. Thank you for your help with this great 'joined up' village service. Also, thanks to all the parents who turned up conscientiously with their family to collect and deliver the cards - it all went very smoothly.

Scouting continues to be as popular as it has ever been and we are very fortunate to have such a hardworking and enthusiastic leadership team, including our both our voluntary treasurer and our auditor. Thank you too for the opportunity to advertise the scheme in 'NE43 News'. An excellent example of a co-ordinated village effort!

Play Area Maintenance



(pictured). The rope bridge, the scramble net and single rope climb are all to be replaced in the next few months, as soon as parts are delivered. The Council is to install a new version of scramble net which will remove the raised timber just above ground-level so that the scramble net will fix securely direct to the ground and minimise the risk of injury to users. The multiplay will be out of action for a number of days whilst this work is completed.

The Council is responsible for all aspects of the two play areas, at Branch End and at Kate's Plain. Weekly inspections are carried out by the Council's Grounds Services contractor to ensure that the equipment provided is safe and there are no works necessary at either location. The Council also arranges for an independent annual inspection of the play areas by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents. Despite these checks, things can still go wrong and the Council asks that any faults seen by parents are reported to the Clerk as soon as possible.

Most of the items of play equipment need maintenance, whether it's the application of lubrication or timber preservatives, or the replacement of moving or otherwise wearing parts. This year the Council has authorised the replacement of a number of parts of the multiplay at Branch End

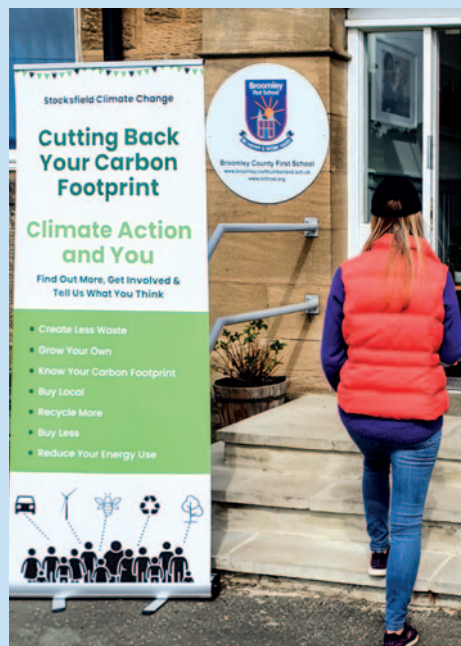


BRIMMING Bins

A number of the Council's litter bins are being filled much more quickly than in the past. There may be many explanations for this but it has caused some problems where rubbish, including wrapped dog faeces, has spilled onto the pavements and has been blown around. Northumberland County Council (NCC) is responsible for emptying litter bins and they do not charge the Council for emptying any of the bins situated within the highway.

The Council is grateful that the bins are being used, rather than litter being dumped in the streets, and is working with NCC to monitor the situation. In the meantime, if a litter bin is full and needs to be emptied, please let NCC know by using the telephone number on the bin - 0345 6006400. Please do not try to cram more into already full bins.

Stocksfield Village welcomed its first Climate Change event on Saturday 14 May at Broomley First School.



The event was arranged by the newly formed Stocksfield Climate Change Group (SCCG), a group of volunteers that wish to address matters related to the environment, biodiversity and mitigating climate change.

The many interesting and informative stands included:

- Broomley First School - Eco warriors and Eco teaching at the school
- Environment Agency - flood mitigation in Stocksfield
- Tyne Rivers Trust - using an interactive model to illustrate actions to reduce erosion, flood risk and improve water quality in the Tyne catchment also demonstrating the work of local volunteers in a long-term project collecting data on water quality in Stocksfield burn.
- Citizen Advice - advice on energy reduction in the home and available grants
- Climate Change Group team - calculating your carbon footprint
- Community Action Northumberland CAN – home insulation advice, free energy audits, demonstrating their thermal camera which detects heat loss spots

- Northumberland County Council Climate Change Team - Climate Change Champions and their Climate Change Action Plan
- Wheelbirks - improving farm environment and biodiversity and reducing carbon dioxide output.
- Active Travel Tynedale – campaigning for infrastructure, arranging walking and cycling events
- The Pantry, Mickley – showing its range of refill products
- Stocksfield Plants and Gardens Society – join and learn about plants to help support wildlife
- Royal Society for the Protection of Birds – join the forthcoming Stocksfield Species Survey
- Go Local Food – join a local co-operative growing organic vegetables

Feedback gathered from attendees will inform the Stocksfield Climate Change Action Plan. This aims to address the priorities of residents and businesses in tackling locally the impact of climate change, and help to improve the environment and our biodiversity.

The next SCCG project will be the habitat survey, covering almost all land in Stocksfield except private gardens. This will be an important first step to identify changes in the environment and biodiversity since the last survey was undertaken in 2003. Further volunteers were recruited, and training will be given to surveyors using the same land classification system used in 2003. More volunteers are most welcome. The species survey will be undertaken by individuals in their private gardens.

The group wishes to inspire and work with volunteers, organisations, businesses, trusts and the education sector in a practical way to make a difference for the future of our children by taking small but decisive steps.

Northumberland Village Halls Heritage Project

Members of Stocksfield Community Association will be aware of this project from reports of trustees' meetings and an article in the February issue of SCAN, the Community Association's monthly newsletter. This project aims to preserve, record and share the heritage of Northumberland's village halls for the benefit of the communities which they serve and for the general public. The project is being organised jointly by staff from Community Action Northumberland (CAN) and Northumberland Archives (in Woodhorn) with funding from the Heritage Lottery.

It is estimated that there are more than 200 village halls in Northumberland, most of which have been the main venue for communal and social activities for the villages and hamlets that they serve for many years, in some cases more than a century. As such they are central to the shared memories of generations of local people. Many halls are historically significant buildings having had previous lives as village schools, reading rooms, chapels, mechanics institutes, industrial buildings, miners' institutes, WW I barracks and, in the case of our Community Centre an army base during WW2 and then used by Northumberland County Council for cooking and distributing meals to local schools. This year we are one of just 15 halls involved in this project; a further 15 halls will take part in a second phase beginning in 2023.

Part of the project will involve collecting oral histories about the role our Community Centre has played in the life of this village and two Community Association trustees have now received training in conducting interviews. The trustees have already identified some areas of our history to be researched and have contacted individual residents whose help will be needed in this research. So far interviews have collected memories of users of the Community Centre including Stocksfield WI, especially memories of the many pantomimes

they performed, and Stocksfield Plants and Gardens Society. More interviews will soon follow including memories of past productions of Stocksfield Players, the South of Tyne Flower Club and Stocksfield Playgroup

Community association trustees are grateful for the support of Stocksfield Local History Society both for the loan of a recorder and access to information about the formation of the former Stocksfield Institute Community Association and its acquisition of the former Stocksfield Parish Institute in 1958-59.

The project is not just about collecting oral memories it also aims to conserve and archive documents, photographs and artefacts. For

example, the original architect's plans for the construction of our building in 1902 are now in Northumberland Archives; facsimiles of these plans are held in the Community Association office. Since the project began copies of some old photographs of the building have been discovered. The photo below is from a postcard dated 1911 – just nine years after the original building opened. We hope that, as the project develops, other photos and documents will be 'discovered'. The project is also about the very recent past – such as how Stocksfield coped with the Covid-19 pandemic - future generations certainly will be interested in that.



Further information will be provided as the project progresses, but this project is not just for members of the board of trustees or even the several hundred members of Stocksfield Community Association. Update from County Councillor **Anne Dale**

The last six months have been busy and now hopefully we may be returning to some form of normality in our lives. At the time of writing, many of you will be involved in the organisation of celebrations for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in the village and I am sure there will be lots of photos and stories in the next NE43 and a joyous occasion for everyone.

Covid returned to the village earlier this year, but we can only hope that in time it will become less prevalent. My continued thanks go to the schools and health service in particular, who have continued to work in difficult conditions over such a long period of time.

At the beginning of the year the village was hit by Storm Arwen but we were fortunate that we missed the brunt of it although trees were blown down and roads blocked. County Council officers and the utility and emergency services all worked together under Gold Command which was headed by the County Council. It will take some time to clear and replant some of the woodlands which were badly hit.

The new County Council Local Plan has now been agreed. This new plan brings together all the previous District Council local plans and I hope to see better and more consistent planning decisions made. Neighbourhood plans too are so important in delivering how you want the future of your village to develop over the coming years ahead.

The Government has given FACTCO the go ahead to provide full fibre broadband to the village. Work has already started; you may have noticed the new cabinet next to the Branch End Play Area. The delivery to individual houses will be undertaken in area blocks throughout the village and you will be informed as to when work will commence in your particular block. A briefing session for residents is to be held in July with the beginning of the roll out in August. If you have not yet signed up then please do so, if you wish to be included in the roll out. If you would like further information do contact me.

The maintenance and utility work on the A695 throughout the village have been ongoing for over the last two years and there is still more in hand. The renewal of the main gas pipes had been planned for some time. However there have been intermittent leaks in the water and gas mains which have hindered the renewal work. Blocked gullies continue to be an issue in various areas - the Council has purchased new and better gulley cleaners but unfortunately not more.

I continue to work with various groups on local projects. The County Council enabled me to take forward the planting of a small orchard on Birkdene with pupils from Broomley School. There was much digging and discussion on the importance of trees in the environment together with pollination. The school's litter picking group 'The Stocksfield Garbage Crew' is now well established and they are out and about with the school and their families keeping the village free of litter. Thank you also to the Scouts who have also been out litter picking too and not forgetting those longstanding 'litter pickers' too! I continue to work with residents to find land to plant more trees in the coming winter. If you have any ideas, please let me know.
