Included in this edition of NE43 News you will find a copy of our 2018 residents' survey, which we really hope you will complete and return as soon as possible. The survey has been designed to seek your views on what the Parish Council should prioritise in the next five years, and how you would like us to allocate our resources, and is being carried out on our behalf by an independent research company. The results of the survey will form the basis of our next Parish Council Plan, so please have your say and let us know how you would like to see things developing in the area which the Council covers. As a bonus, if you complete and return the survey by 21 December 2018, you could win a £100 hamper in time for Christmas. We really value your opinions and are looking forward to receiving them.

Council name to change

This will almost certainly be the last newsletter from Broomley and Stocksfield Parish Council. After asking residents through this newsletter about views on a possible name change, the Council has decided to amend its name to 'Stocksfield Parish Council', thereby dropping reference to Broomley. Northumberland County Council has been asked to approve the change and this is likely to occur within the next two months.





Overspill Car Park **OPENS**

The Council is delighted that the long awaited overspill car park at the sports fields has been constructed and is now in use, both by the users of the sports fields and the parents of children who attend Broomley First School. The car park provides an additional 42 spaces and now prevents the need for cars to park on the A695. The Council is greatly indebted to local resident, Nick Jones, who provided his services as a landscape surveyor without charge during the design, planning application and construction

stages whilst working closely with the Council's Clerk. Nick Jones is pictured with the Council's Chair, Maggi Hunt, at the new car park. Maggi said, 'It is no exaggeration to say that Nick has made a vital contribution to the project and without him the Council's costs would have been considerably higher.'

The new car park is accessed from the existing car park on a tarmac road. For those interested in the detail, the surface of the overspill car park is a green coloured interlocking plastic tile (as seen being held by Nick in the photo) on top of a granular sub base. Grass has grown through the tiles which means it blends in far better to the surrounding playing fields but also provides a sound surface for parking. The area had

previously been used as an overflow parking area but could only be used during dry periods or cars simply sunk in the mud.

The construction was undertaken by Durham firm Trevor Atkinson and Co after a tendering process. The total cost has been just over £55,000, the majority of which was sourced from the Public Works Loan Board and which the Council will repay over the next twenty years.





Speeders take a hit

Northumbria Police has recommenced enforcement of the speed limit on New Ridley Road using the force's camera enforcement unit. The bright yellow and blue van has been seen regularly on New Ridley Road in recent weeks as pictured. In the first two visits the unit detected 36 speeding offences and one offence of a driver not being in proper control of a vehicle. At least one driver in a subsequent visit by the unit will be facing a court appearance after being measured travelling at over 50mph. The Parish Council has been exerting pressure over many months to ensure that enforcement activity was resumed and is grateful to Northumberland County Council for undertaking the necessary work to enable deployment of the camera unit.



Each year the December edition of NE43 News carries a short item about the Remembrance Service and there is usually a photograph or two. This year things were a bit special. One hundred years on from Armistice Day, over 200 people gathered at the War Memorial in Stocksfield to pay their respects to those who sadly didn't live to see the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month or who were injured during the Great War and also to those who have been killed or injured in subsequent conflicts around the globe. An array of knitted poppies (handmade by local residents) surrounded the memorial, together with photographs and personal stories of many of those were killed and whose names are listed on the plaque attached to the memorial.

The service, which was attended by officers of the 3rd Regiment Royal Horse Artillery based at Albemarle Barracks and the young members of the local Scouting and Guiding organisations, conducted by Rev Pat Moran who reminded those present of the great sacrifices made by many of our forebears. She made particular reference to relatives of local resident Daphne Threadgolddonated Reay who had commemorative seat which is now installed at one side of the memorial. Lloyd Spencer, a former Stocksfield Beaver, Cub and Scout, sounded Last Post prior to the laying of wreaths by Deputy Carol Lieutenant representing Her Majesty the Queen and by those others present on behalf of other organisations. Following the 'silence', the service was roused by the sounding of Reveille.

At the conclusion of the service, many of those present returned to the Community Centre where tea, coffee and biscuits were served by Stocksfield Guides. A collection of £108 was raised for the Royal British Legion by those taking refreshments. A presentation of more information about Stocksfield residents who died during both wars was provided at the rear of the Community Centre by Laraine Judd. Laraine has been researching this area for many years and is responsible for providing the

information at the memorial. Afterwards Laraine said, 'Thanks to everyone who showed an interest in the names of local men and women who died in both World Wars'. She asks if anyone has any other photographs, information or anecdotes about these people,

The Robsons of Stocksfield

The anniversary of 100 years since the end of the Great War in 1918 will stir memories in many families, particularly that of Daphne Threadgold-Reay (pictured above with her son and grandson) whose maternal grandfather Ernest Robson James served in France with the XII Royal Lancers, Northumberland Fusiliers and whose paternal great uncle Robert William Robson died in France with the 55th Sqdn Royal Flying Corps.

In the early 1980s when Nick Threadgold and his family moved to Rose Cottage at Ridley Mill, Stocksfield, little did he know that he would be living in an area which his forbears farmed over 100 years before. Nick's son, Thomas James Threadgold, born in 2018, will discover in years to come that his grandmother Daphne can trace her family back to Ridley Mill Farm for many generations, and will understand the significance of

the seat she donated at the War Memorial commemorating the 1914-1918 Great War.

STOCKSFIELD

Daphne's great grandfather Mark Oswald Robson was born at Ridley Mill Farm in 1861. Mark married Isabella, who was born in Berwick and moved to Bywell to work as lady's maid to Lady Allendale. They had 8 children, John (Jack – Daphne's grandfather), Mark, Amy, William, Robert, Fred, Lewis and Ada. Sadly Mark Snr died

in 1909 aged 49, and is buried at Bywell St Peters. Jack continued to manage the farm with his mother and supported his young siblings.

Mark Jnr became
a miner, and
William a cart boy
leading goods from
Stocksfield Station
through Guessburn
up to Old Ridley
and Hindley.

With the onset of the Great War, Robert William Robson decided to join the 55th Sqdn

Royal Flying Corps as a mechanic. As a pilot Robert flew many missions, but sadly in February 1917 his plane was hit by enemy fire. Robert was shot in the head and his observer was killed outright, but Robert managed to fly his aircraft back over allied lines where he suffered a fractured skull on landing. He died in Rouen Hospital on 18 May 1917 aged 21, and was buried at the Bois-Guillaume Cemetery. On Whit Monday 1917 a Memorial Service was held for Robert at Bywell St Peters. On 1 March 1919 his mother Isabella was issued with

a passport and travelled to France to visit Roberts's grave. Robert's name is listed on the Stocksfield War Memorial Daphne's grandfather Jack married Frances Mary Stanfield from Bearl: their children John (Scotty) Lewis and Daleus were born

at Ridley Mill
Farm. The family,
including Isabella, moved
to Mickley Bank Farm where

Daphne's father Mark was born, and then moved to Brewery Farm in Ovingham where Daphne spent her younger years.

STATION ADOPTION

Northern Rail and the Tyne Valley Community Rail Partnership are keen to establish a Station Adoption Group for Stocksfield. This group of volunteers would undertake activities designed to maintain and promote Stocksfield Station. Adoption groups are all different! Some plant flowers, while others work with local schools to display children's art work. 2019 is a Festival Year and it will be 10 years since the first Festival in 2009!

Stocksfield Festival 2019 will show a number of significant changes - the most obvious one will be that the Festival is moving from the first Saturday in September to the second Saturday in July. So put Saturday 13th July in your new diary as that will be the date of next year's Festival.

Another major change is that there will be no competitions – well except for the Scarecrow competition which the Committee hopes to see extended with far more entries than in 2017 – more details later!

The first Festival in 2009 was partly about local organisations promoting their activities. This has not really happened in recent Festivals so at the Festival in 2019, space and display boards will be available within a marquee for local groups to showcase their activities.

The Festival Committee's venture into organising a Food Fair in September this year was so successful that visitors to next year's Festival will see far more local food producers offering their products for sale.

For many visitors the music is the main attraction and once more there will be lots of talented local musicians and singers in the entertainment marquee to provide high quality entertainment.

Accounts get clean bill of health

You could be forgiven for thinking that audit work is not exactly headline material but the external audit arrangements for town and parish councils changed for the financial year 2017/18. Large numbers of smaller councils no longer need to submit returns to external auditors, instead relying on an effective internal audit of their activity. This Council's external audit for 2017/18 has been completed and the good news is there are no matters to draw to the attention of the Council. The report of the auditor can be found on the Council's website.

The important work of the Council's internal auditor continues and it is this work that looks very closely, not only at the figures to make sure they all add up, but also at the way the Council's financial management systems work and the safeguards in place. The interim internal audit for 2018/19 has already been completed and the auditor finds that 'the robust financial and management systems in place are acting satisfactorily and provide a good audit trail'. Your precept remains in safe hands!

A69 improvements on hold

Highways England plans to improve the junction on the A69 at Styford where it meets the A68 and B6530 by constructing a flyover that would allow traffic on the A69 to bypass the existing roundabout. Whilst some members of the Parish Council were surprised that this was seen to be a priority, the Council had concerns about the accompanying proposals to restrict traffic joining or crossing the A69 at the junction at Shaw House (where roads lead north to Newton and south to Peepy Farm and Stocksfield). The Council subsequently objected to the improvements on the grounds that, taken as a whole, they would disproportionately affect the residents of Stocksfield by increasing the distance and times of journeys. Bywell Parish Council made an objection on similar grounds. The Secretary of State has since indicated that he intends to hold an Inquiry into the proposal, further details of which will be provided in due course. The Council's Chair, Maggi Hunt said, 'It is pleasing to see that local voices will at least be heard before a final decision is taken'.

Branch End Surgery NEWS

Due to a nationwide shortage of flu vaccine for the 65+ age group the surgery is offering flu jab appointments by appointment or by walk in. Please speak to a receptionist to book in – call 01661 842626 or ask if anybody is available to give you your vaccination there and then.

In October of this year a total of 63 patients did not attend their scheduled appointment at the surgery - known as DNA (did not attend) appointments. This is a significant increase from October 2017 when the total DNA appointments was 35. Each of these non-attended appointments has prevented doctors or nurses from seeing another patient instead. The surgery operates an 'on the day cancellation list' so that where patients need to cancel appointment, their slot can be given to patients who need to be seen that day and can attend at any time. Please help to provide faster access to appointments by cancelling appointments you cannot keep.

New Child Welfare Officers at Stocksfield Football Club



Testing water quality on Stocksfield burn

It is now nearly 10 years since water quality testing began on Stocksfield burn. Those who regularly use the burn side footpath will have seen members of the Stocksfield River Watch team identifying and counting the larval forms of various 'river flies' – most of which can loosely be described as mayflies. Water quality is determined by the presence or otherwise of a number of key indicator species – those which can't



This small group of volunteers (some pictured) – who have hardly missed a month in almost 10 years - are about to acquire some additional kit which will allow further tests of water quality to be carried out. The kit will be used for the first time on Monday 3rd December and will enable volunteers to test for phosphates, nitrates and nitrites, turbidity, pH etc.

This work is organised and co-ordinated by the Tyne Rivers Trust which provides training and support for volunteers. The local volunteers and the Tyne Rivers Trust are grateful for the support of the Parish Council which funded new water quality testing kit at a cost of \pounds 40.

A new project is about to start called "Adopt a Stream" - led by Tyne Rivers Trust and delivered through the Tyne catchment Partnership. Further information on this project, which will include issues relating to invasive species, recording wildlife and flooding can be obtained from the Tyne Rivers Trust office.

Stocksfield Cricket Club win again

Stocksfield Cricket Club fielded 13 teams this summer. This included 7 junior teams with additional coaching for the All Stars scheme (pictured) which is aimed at 5 to 7 year olds. An U14 girl's team was a new addition this season.

The 1st team played in the Northumberland Cricket League Premier Division for the first time ever after gaining promotion last year. It was the 2nd XI that took the honours however, winning their division and promotion. Not to be outdone, the Women's 2nd Team won their League and a talented young U11 team (pictured) won the County Knock Out cup competition.

The club ran a number of fund raising events during the year which, together with some grant funding, allowed them to refurbish the practice nets and install a

Northumberland County Council - update from Anne Dale

Although there is always lots to report, this is just a brief note on mainly highways issues. I am pleased that the maintenance work on New Ridley Road has finally taken place. Consultation has taken place on speed reduction measures for New Ridley village and will take place on similar measures for New Ridley Road. Unfortunately the roll out of the 20 mph on the Painshawfield Estate and at the beginning and the end of the school day on the A695 has been delayed and the consultation event will not take place until early next year. This is due to the prioritisation of the anti-skid surface at Ford Rise.

Double yellow lines are to be implemented at Branch End and at the junction of Batt House Road and New Ridley Road to provide safer access points. (Parking is one of the issues that residents continually raise with me together with speeding and blocked gullies.)

In January the draft local plan will be out for consultation on the soundness of the proposed plan before submission.
