Chair's Annual Report 2018/19

In another eventful year, the Parish Council has completed a long-standing project, sought the views of residents, and effected a name change, as well as continuing to maintain and improve facilities in the area which we cover. We have done our best to ensure that our area remains a safe place to live, work and visit, and to deal with local problems whenever possible, often in partnership with local community organisations and bodies, other public such Northumberland County Council, Northumbria Police and neighbouring Town and Parish Councils.

Last autumn saw the completion of the much anticipated extension to the car park at the sports fields, which provides 42 additional spaces. Thanks to the expertise and generosity of local resident, Nick Jones, who, working closely with the Council's Clerk, provided his services as a landscape surveyor without charge during the design, planning application and construction stages, the cost of the project was kept as low as possible.



As well as offering convenient parking for the sports fields and Broomley First School, the overspill car park will support Stocksfield Cricket Club's application for planning permission to extend and upgrade the clubhouse.

What is in a name?

Although this is the 66th edition of NE43 News, **Stocksfield Parish Council** welcomes you to its first newsletter. As reported in the December issue, and referred to in the Chair's annual report, Northumberland County Council formally changed the name of the Parish Council in January of this year. You may on occasions continue to see reference to the old name but legislation specifically allows for this so that, for example, contracts remain valid despite the change of name.

The Remembrance Service in November, marking the centenary of the end of the First World War, was conducted by Rev. Pat Moran, and attended by over 200 people, including officers of the 3rd Regiment Royal Horse Artillery (based at Albemarle Barracks) and young people from the local Scouts and Guides groups. In memory of her great uncle, who died in France in 1917 with the 55th Sqdn Royal Flying Corps, and

her grandfather, who served in France with the XII Royal Lancers, Northumberland Fusiliers, local resident Daphne Threadgold-Reay very generously donated a commemorative bench to the village, and this now

has pride of place next to the War Memorial, on which her great uncle's name appears.


Photographs and personal stories of other local men whose names are listed on the War Memorial

had been put together and displayed around the memorial by Laraine Judd of Stocksfield Local History Society, who was also responsible for a presentation on the same subject shown at Stocksfield Community

Centre after the service. I would like to extend my sincere thanks to everyone who contributed to this genuine community event, including those local residents who knitted the poppies that were on display.



In December, the Parish Council's residents' survey was delivered to every household in the area we cover. Designed to seek residents' views on what our priorities should be for the next five years and



how we should allocate our resources during that period, the survey was carried out on our behalf by Eljay Research Ltd, an independent company. The survey was completed by around one household in every three, and has given us a robust baseline of information which will guide the plans we make for the future. Sincere thanks to everyone who responded at such a busy time of year.

Last Christmas may now seem a long time ago, but one abiding memory surely has to be the magical sight of the Christmas tree at Broomley First School with its coloured lights twinkling in the winter twilight. This is just one example of the high standard of work carried out by our Groundsman, whose attention to detail and commitment to our area make a significant contribution to the quality of our environment.

After seeking local residents' views in the June issue of NE43 News, the Parish Council made a formal request to Northumberland County Council to amend the Parish name to Stocksfield. The request was granted in January, and we are now in the process of reflecting this change wherever our name appears around the village and surrounding areas.



The speed and volume of traffic on the A695 and New Ridley Road have continued to be a key concern for Councillors and residents. Responsibility for highways lies with Northumberland County Council, so the role of the Parish Council is to ensure that residents' concerns are brought to the attention of our County Councillor and County Council officers, and to work in partnership with other relevant



organisations such as Northumbria Police. We are pleased that our efforts to encourage further enforcement of the speed limit on New Ridley Road have been successful, and we await additional information from Northumberland County Council about their proposals for speed restrictions on the A695 between Branch End and Stocksfield station.

In the past year, the Parish Council has given grants and donations worth over £2,000 to a number of local and Countywide groups, including Citizens Advice Northumberland, Tynedale Hospice at Home, Sport Tynedale, Tyne Rivers Trust and the North East War Memorials Project. The funding supports specific projects which benefit members of our community. The Parish Council also makes an annual financial contribution to the Parochial Church Council's Burial Board which looks after the cemetery at St Margaret's Church in Hindley.

The Parish Council's Advisory Groups have continued to play an important part in our work during the year by focusing in detail on specific aspects and making recommendations for action to the full Council. Particular thanks are due to the Rights of Way and Environment Advisory Group which, though chaired by a Parish Councillor, is largely made up of local residents who volunteer their time to monitor the health of the river and the burn, control invasive species and review our footpaths and rights of way. The Group has also recently established a Station Adoption Group in partnership with Tyne Valley Community Rail Partnership and Northern Rail.

Council membership has remained stable throughout the year, but we still have three vacancies. If you have found this report interesting, and would like to make a direct contribution to the work that we do, why not apply to join us as a co-opted Councillor?

In conclusion, I would like to express my sincere thanks to our Clerk, Nick Spencer, for his invaluable advice and consummate professionalism, to our Groundsman, Martin Stewart, for his enthusiasm and versatility, and to my fellow Parish Councillors for their support and teamwork during the last twelve months.

Residents' Survey - The Results

Over the course of December 2018, online, postal and face-to-face research with the Parish's residents was independently undertaken for Stocksfield Parish Council.

Almost 450 residents - around I in every 3 households - contributed to the research, giving the findings a robust, current and reliable framework from which to derive key messages and conclusions.

The survey shows an extremely high level of overall contentment with living in the Parish. Residents detail an area of beautiful countryside, with accompanying tranquillity and good transport links, whilst living alongside friendly neighbours.

Leaving aside this over-arching general contentment, there are undoubtedly still areas of suggested improvement. Residents would like to see certain issues effectively tackled - most frequently including the volume and speed of traffic in the Parish, improved public transport and re-surfaced and improved roads and footpaths.

They would also appreciate the addition of local eating and drinking facilities, giving the community a focal point at which to socialise in an informal setting. The addition of more independent shops would also be welcomed by a sizeable percentage of residents.

The NE43 newsletter is very well regarded, read and valued, and is undoubtedly the preferred choice for Council-resident communication.

In the context of the vast majority of residents confidently using the Internet within the Parish, the potential of a faster broadband service is enthusiastically greeted and encouraged.

Parish clubs and classes are attended by a healthy proportion of residents, and there is significant interest in the possibility of community events such as an annual summer fair, bonfire night and village competitions. Many residents feel that there is justification for the Parish Council to fund such events.

The principle of increasing the Parish Precept to fund additional works also receives a significant amount of support - with just 16% of residents opposed to this idea. Support is underpinned by the view that this enhances and adds to existing services, devolves some powers locally and essentially improves Parish life.

The Parish Council is commended for its work and performance by the vast majority of residents - all of whom appreciate the results of their labours and the voluntary time and commitment which they invest.

Remembrance Service 2019

A695 to be closed

The annual Remembrance Service has been attracting increasing numbers of residents over the last few years and the Council is delighted at the level of support shown in the village. However, as a result of the increase, the Council has reviewed the arrangements for traffic management in conjunction with Northumberland County Council. In order to ensure the safety of those attending the service, the Councils have decided to close the A695 on Sunday 10 November 2019 between 10.30am and 11.30am. The agreed diversionary route will take westbound traffic along New Ridley Road to Apperley Dene, then on the B6309 and the unclassified road through Broomley onto the A68, before rejoining the A695 at Broomhaugh roundabout, and the same in reverse for eastbound traffic. The Councils will try to ensure that relevant operators of goods vehicles are made aware of the diversion so that drivers can adjust their journey time and route accordingly but inevitably there will be additional traffic on the diversion route during the closure. No traffic will be allowed to use the A695 between the entrances to the railway station and sports fields car park during the closure. Access to the car parks for those attending the service and to residential side roads outside of the closed section of the A695 for residents will be maintained.

The Councils apologise for the impact this will have but hope that those residents affected will understand that the closure is for a short period and the decision has been taken simply on safety grounds so that Stocksfield can continue to honour those from our communities who gave their lives in previous conflicts.

If you have been put off attending the Service because of the proximity to the road, why not come along this year? Everyone is also welcome to enjoy tea and coffee which will be served afterwards in the Community Centre by Stocksfield Guides.



The Beacon Opens

As part of the National Garden Scheme, the Beacon at 10 Crabtree Road, Stocksfield, will be open to the public between 2pm and 6pm on Sunday 9 June 2019. This garden illustrates how to make a cottage garden on a steep site with loads of interest at different levels. It is planted with acers, roses and a variety of cottage garden and formal plants. Water runs gently through it and there are tranquil places to sit and talk or just reflect. Stunning colour and plant combinations prevail. Cream teas and plants are for sale. What has the Parish Council ever done for us?

This newsletter has, over the years, included a number of articles which have tried to demonstrate the range of activities and services provided by the Parish Council. Resisting the temptation for 'pythonesque' humour afforded by the title, without residents who are prepared to be parish councillors, the simple day to day functions of the Council, simply could not occur. The Council has three current vacancies. If you are interested in becoming a parish councillor by being co-opted on to the Council, please get in touch with the Chair or the Clerk for further information. You must be at least 18 years of age and qualify by meeting one of the following criteria:

- be on the register of electors
- be an owner or tenant of land or property in the Council's area
- your main or only place of work during the preceding 12 months has been in the Council's area
- you have resided in the area for at least 12 months or within 3 miles of it.

Stocksfield Burn is in good health

The monthly monitoring of river fly larvae in Stocksfield burn continues with results submitted direct to the Anglers Riverfly Monitoring Initiative website. Since December 2018 additional tests, directly testing water quality, have been carried out using a test kit supplied by the Tyne Rivers Trust (TRT) and paid for by Stocksfield Parish Council (cost £40). Water is now tested for oxygen content, pH and turbidity. Nitrate and nitrite levels are also tested and visual reports submitted on weather water levels, conditions, temperature, presence of invasive species etc. Levels of both indicator species and water quality remain high.

A team of up to 7 volunteers is involved (and some are pictured) - all part of the TRT's "My Tyne: Adopt a Stream" scheme. If you want further information about the scheme or are interested in joining the group, please contact Norman Hooks on 01661 844863 or njhooks13@gmail.com



In danger, need the police, but can't speak?

- 1 Dial 99
- Listen to the questions from the 999 operator
- Respond by coughing or tapping the handset if you can
- If prompted, press 55
 This lets the 999 call operator know it's a genuine emergency and you'll be put through to the police,





999 silent option Every day the police nationally receive thousands of accidental or hoax 999 calls. Differentiating a caller who cannot speak but is in urgent need of police assistance can be a matter of life or death. Northumbria Police has been supporting a national campaign to raise awareness of a system that allows callers to alert police when in imminent danger when they are unable to speak.

Ringing 999 alone will not necessarily generate a police response. The Silent Solution system has been working in the UK for many years but its success depends on the public being aware of it. If you are in urgent need of police assistance and you dial 999 but, through fear of placing yourself or others in danger, you cannot speak, simply cough into or tap the handset. You can also follow the automated prompts that will follow and, when asked, press 55 on the keypad. This will identify to the call handler that you need the police urgently.

Funding for local groups

The Parish Council sets aside funds each year to make awards of grants to local groups and organisations which are based or work in Stocksfield and provide benefit to local people. Grants of up to £500 can be made during the financial year but applications for grants in excess of £500 must be made before October preceding the financial year in which the funds are needed. This allows the Council to take larger sums into account when setting its budget for the following year. Full details and application forms can be found on the Council's website under 'Policy Documents'. Normally the Council considers grant applications on two occasions during the year (in April and November) and there are deadlines for applications to be received. If you think you cannot meet the timescales or want advice about the Council's Grant Award Policy, then please contact the clerk - details are on the last page of the newsletter. Individuals are not eligible to apply.

Update from County Councillor Anne Dale

A consultation event on the initial proposals for the introduction of a 20 mph speed limit outside school at the beginning and the end of the school day will take place on Tuesday, I I June between 2pm and 7pm at the Stocksfield Cricket Club. County Council officers will be in attendance to respond to your questions and hear your views. The 2 pm start is to give the opportunity for parents to attend before the end of the school day. County Council officers will also be in attendance to discuss any broadband issues you may have. The highways work that has been taking place over the last two months by a private contractor has been carefully monitored by the County Council Street Works inspectors. All concerns have been taken up with the contractor. There have been concerns raised by residents on rogue traders calling at their doors. I have advice from the police so please contact me if you would like a copy. The police's main message was to advise residents to ring them on 101 if they feel at all intimidated.




"FRIENDS ON FRIDAYS" AT STOCKSFIELD QUAKER MEETING HOUSE
