- a tribute



It has been a remarkable year in many ways for the Royal Family and it would be wrong to open this edition of NE43 News without paying tribute to Her Late Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II. First, in June, the many celebrations marking the occasion of Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee were seen across the county, including locally at Bywell Hall. A report of the day at Bywell with many photographs is featured on the following pages. Then in September the country and the world were stunned by the peaceful passing of the Queen at Balmoral. The Council recognises her life of service and dedication to the country and the impact her selflessness had across the globe. The Council wishes His Majesty King Charles III good health, great wisdom, and strength during his reign.

Council VACANCIES

The Parish Council has a number of vacancies for councillors which it is able to fill by co-option. Although the lowest tier of local government parish councils are closest to their communities and have an essential role in local democracy. The Council is responsible for delivering a number of local services such as providing and maintaining the play areas, sports facilities, defibrillator network and planted areas in the village. Meeting once a month (except for August) at Stocksfield Community Centre, councillors oversee the budget and influence, by way of commenting to other bodies, many issues and proposals that affect the village. If you are interested in becoming a parish councillor, please get in touch with the Chair or Clerk for further information. Contact details for both can be found on the website together with the Council's co-option policy.

Grant FUNDING

Each year the Council sets aside funds to support local community groups and organisations to help expand and develop their activities. Application for grants of up to £500 are welcomed using the application forms on the Council's website where the full grant policy can be found: https://www.stocksfieldpc.org.uk/other/24 4-grant-award-policy. Applications need to be for a specific purpose rather than to pay for day-to-day running costs and individuals are not eligible to apply. Applicants need to be based or operating in the Civil Parish of Stocksfield. If you want advice about submitting an application, contact the Clerk.

Budget and precept 2023/24

The budget for the next financial year (2023/24) is likely to be discussed and agreed at the Parish Council meeting on 6 December 2022. Councillors will then need to decide how that will be funded and. specifically, how much of the budget income will be collected through the precept levied as part of council tax. The Council will obviously take into account the cost-of-living pressures facing all residents as well as its own rising costs. The Council's precept has been £99,006 for the past three years (since 2020/21) which has equated to an annual charge of just over £74 for a Band D house. Keep an eye on the Council's website for more information.



By the time this newsletter is delivered to residents, three Christmas trees will have been erected in the village, all purchased by the Parish Council. In addition to the usual trees at Broomley First School and at the Dr Syntax at New Ridley, the Council has purchased a tree for the eastern entrance of Stocksfield which is being hosted by Branch End Service Station. The service station's owners (M&L Richardson and Sons Ltd) have also provided the Council with a donation of £300 towards the cost of new Christmas lighting for the additional tree for which the Council is extremely grateful.

Parish councillors hope that their residents all enjoy Christmas and send their best wishes to all for the New Year.

Rememberance Service **2022**



On Sunday 13 November, Stocksfield remembered those who have, over many years and in many conflicts, given their lives for their country or been injured in service. This year the Service at the War Memorial was led by Reader lane Algar, supported by Rev Dr Pat Moran. The Third Regiment of the Royal Horse Artillery which has supported remembrance services in the Tyne Valley for many years, was unable to be present having been deployed recently. The enthusiasm of Stocksfield's Scouting and Guiding organisations made up for the absence of the army. Deputy Lieutenant Mrs Fiona Lees-Millais was present and laid a wreath for the Lieutenancy on behalf of King Charles III, along with wreaths from the Parish Council, the County Council, Northumbria Police and the Guides. After the Service, many residents returned to the Community Centre where refreshments were served by Stocksfield Guides.



Tyne Rivers Trust's River Safari

We know that time spent in nature is a wonderful thing. Rivers are inspiring and our natural places are important for wildlife and for our own well-being.

We want to encourage people to observe and enjoy their local rivers so, with the assistance of funding from the Parish Council, we've created three walks around Stocksfield Burn, through our River Safari project.

The walks have highlighted points of interest – you can spot wildlife or invasive species, take a photo to monitor a specific site over time, learn about conservation work or just to take time to listen to the babbling water and relax.

Each walk starts in Stocksfield Woodland Car Park and takes you over the hill towards the top of Stocksfield Burn. Depending on the length you wish to walk you can either follow the burn and then turn back towards the hill after the tennis courts or continue down to the fish passes and fords across the road. If you want to explore further, our longest walk of 3.5 miles takes you up to Broomley and back towards the car park through the woods. These are beautiful walks exploring the rivers and woods around Stocksfield. You can download or print each map with walking directions from the website above.

BIRDS & BEES

You may have noticed a distinct lack of swallows and house martins over Stocksfield this summer, and perhaps wondered why?

Insects are their sole food source, taken on the wing, and we know that insects are in serious decline everywhere. By planting wild flowers we can provide food for bees, butterflies, moths and flies which will in turn pollinate the flowers.

HEDGEROWS

Regular readers of NE43 News could be forgiven for skipping this item – it's all too predictable. Every year there are complaints from residents about hedgerows and tree branches growing across roads and pavements. Sometimes roadways are narrowed so that it is difficult

for cars to pass and all too often pavements have become obstructed so that pedestrians need to use the road. Even the odd bramble during the hours of darkness can cause injury to someone out walking. Those with disabilities or children and the elderly are at particular risk.

Please be considerate to other residents. Where hedgerows on boundaries are adjacent to public spaces, please keep them trimmed back to the edge of your property and make sure that low hanging tree branches are suitably cut back.



Stocksfield Tuesday Club on BBC News



Stocksfield Tuesday Club is one of **Community Action** Northumberland's (CAN) Warm Hubs and has been for over seven years. Through the scheme, groups across the county offer warm food in a warm place to anyone who wants to come along. There are now about 30 such places most operating in village halls or community centres - though at least one meets in a village church. Not all open every week, and most don't offer a hot, freshly cooked midday meal; we think our Tuesday Club may be the only one in the county which does both.

When we were asked by Christine Nicholls (CAN) if we were willing to let the BBC film "A Warm Hub in action", we agreed, thinking that it would be for a regional programme – Look North had covered us delivering meals out in the snow a few years ago. What we didn't know was that BBC Breakfast was promoting how communities might deal with the huge rise in gas and electricity charges – and 'warm spaces' and 'warm hubs' were suddenly news.

So, on Tuesday 4 October the team of three, including one cameraman, arrived - not from Newcastle but from London. They were with us for over two hours and, apart from filming and interviewing some of those attending and volunteers, they also launched a drone to take aerial views of Mount View Terrace and the Community Centre. The lead presenter, Ellie Price, asked a lot of questions about the Warm Hub scheme in Northumberland and

specific questions about Tuesday Club, including how we started and advice for anyone wanting to set up something similar. I think Ellie was surprised to find we had been part of the warm hub scheme for seven years and actually started eleven years ago when the 'Meals on Wheels' service ended. Some of our members said all the right things about having somewhere warm to go to although, as almost all those who attend live alone, the chance to sit round big tables eating a meal with friends is the most important factor. Some had already enjoyed a pre-lunch of carpet bowls in the hall Scrabble or cards in the Richardson Room. Scrabble and cards invariably carry on after the meal.

Then the BBC team went off by taxi to Newcastle to catch the train to London after telling us their report would be on the BBC Breakfast programme the following Monday. It was aired at 7.15am but shown again on the national news at 1pm and 6pm. As a result, some members and volunteers had phone calls from relatives and friends from all over the country.

Stocksfield has a long tradition of providing this sort of support; older residents will remember an over-60s Club and a 'Meals on Wheels' Service which operated for over 40 years, only ending in 2011 when it was replaced by what is now Tuesday Club. All those who currently benefit from Tuesday Club would agree that the key to its success is the commitment of so many volunteers, including teams of cooks, servers, deliverers (of meals to those unable to attend) and, not least, volunteers who come in just to wash up. We even have one volunteer who collects people who have no other means of getting to the Community Centre. It's clear that these volunteers enjoy their work, and the Annual Christmas Dinner at Stocksfield Golf Club will again be an opportunity for everyone, volunteers included, to get together.

Sarah Cooper is Age UK Northumberland's 'Scams Specialist' and she is running a Scams Awareness and Support Programme over the next 18 months. The programme provides practical advice and support, free of charge, to help older people identify potential scams, learn what to do if they are faced with someone trying to scam them and of course support if they have suffered from a scam.

We all know someone who has been scammed - sophisticated scams have been on the rise during the pandemic with criminals devising even more ways to target those they believe to be vulnerable. This means it's even more vital to support those that may be at greater risk. Scams can have a devastating effect on older victims and that is why we have launched this important programme to help keep older people in Northumberland as safe as possible.

The Scams Awareness and Support Programme offers two levels of support: Group Scams awareness sessions- delivered to older people and their trusted others, and one-to-one support - our advice and support is free of charge, treated in the strictest of confidence and individualised to fit the customer's needs.

The team is happy to make home visits or meet at a local community venue. Individuals can self-refer, or a professional can make a client approved referral to the Programme which can

also access and install free call blocker units for customers struggling with phone scams or for those who are more at risk through reduced cognitive functioning.
