Re-dedication of Stocksfield War Memorial

At this year's Remembrance Day Service at Stocksfield War Memorial, held on 9th November, the plaque recording the names of those who fell in the First World War was re-dedicated. The plaque, stolen earlier in the year, has now been replaced. This new plaque has been made possible through a grant from the War Memorials Trust and the generosity of individuals who were moved by the theft. The balance of the cost has been made up by the Parish Council.


The service, attended by around 200 people, was conducted by the Rev. Bill Rigby, the new Vicar of Bywell & Mickley. Among those present were representatives of the 3/9 Royal Artillery from Albermarle Barracks, the Parish Council, members of the Scouts, Guides, Cubs and Brownies in Stocksfield and local residents.

This year the Parish Council wreath was laid by Mr Bill Walker whose cousin, Kenneth Walker, is one of those named on the War Memorial. After the service many of those present went to SICA to enjoy refreshments served by the Guides and Brownies.



Keep dogs out of play areas

The Parish Council has received complaints that residents are exercising their dogs on children's play areas. Obviously dogs are banned from these areas as dog faeces can carry disease. Please do not take your dog onto Branch End Play Area, Kates Plain, or either of the Sportsfields. Thank you.



Flooding

Over the past few weeks, the Parish Council has been discussing the problems which caused the flooding on 6th September.

Of particular concern are blocked drains and gullies, and the Parish Council continues to put pressure on the County Council to get these cleared and, where necessary, repaired.

Second Ford

It will be some months before the ford can be repaired. Until that time it is closed and unusable; there is a deep hole which would seriously damage any vehicle attempting to drive through.

Discussions at the November Parish Council meeting suggested that the bed of Stocksfield Burn had silted up in recent years and that this in part meant that it was more prone to breaking its banks. It is therefore important that garden and other waste is not tipped into the burn.

Damage to the Footpath along Stocksfield Burn

The Parish Council has been in discussion with representatives from the Environment Agency, NCC Countryside Services and Milecastle Housing regarding the best way to repair the bank in the area behind the Tennis Club. A detailed analysis of the problems on this section of the burn has been received from the director of the Tyne Rivers Trust. This advice has been passed on to NCC Countryside Services and the Environment Agency. Engineers from NCC are currently working on creating a long term solution. NCC is also in discussion with Milecastle Housing over meeting the cost of what will inevitably be a very expensive repair. It is hoped that repair work will start soon.

Large Stocksfield Hall extension planned

The Engineering Business, which currently employs 160 staff, has outgrown its existing offices in Riding Mill. With approximately 75 staff already working in Stocksfield, they plan to relocate to Stocksfield Hall, and expand eventually to 300 employees. In association with Allendale Estates, it will submit a planning application to add a second floor to part of the current building, and add additional two storey offices. A new car park capable of taking 260 cars is also planned; the current capacity

These proposals were the subject of a consultation event at SICA on 17th November, and the topic was discussed at the Parish Council meeting in December. Councillors will make their recommendations in the best interests of Stocksfield when the formal planning application is received.

Stocksfield Community Garden

Now that the Branch End play equipment has been installed, and the new tarmac path which leads down to it has been completed, the Stocksfield Community Sensory Garden is the next addition to the regeneration scheme for the Branch End play area site.

A planning group comprising representatives from local churches, the Parish Council and the Plants and Gardens Society is forging ahead with plans to create the garden in 2009.

The first phase will be to create a willow tunnel next to the play area for children to play in. Then in the spring a programme of planting, which will be carried out in phases over the next year or so, will begin.

The plan involves flowers, trees and shrubs which will engage all five senses of touch, taste, sight, sound and smell. There will also be a wild flower bank and an area of shrubs designed to attract birds and butterflies. Children from Broomley First school will be helping in the design and the planting.

We would like as many people from Stocksfield and beyond to help with this project. There are several ways in which you can get involved:

- Digging, planting and creating the various features of the garden. The first work day is scheduled for Saturday 10th January 2009, when the willow tunnel will be planted.
- Donating plants for the garden we have a list!
- Sponsoring a plant (£5-£20) or helping with fund-raising we have scheduled a 'Recycle your unwanted Christmas Presents' event on Saturday 14th February from 10.00 a.m. to 12.00 noon at the Baptist Church Hall.
- Helping with maintenance once the garden is finished.

Parish Plan Update

The Parish Plan organising group would like to thank everyone who took the time to answer the questionnaires during our doorstep inquiry last month. The interviewer said he had never had such an enthusiastic response!

The doorstep inquiry was very important, as it gave us a lot of information about what residents feel are the key local issues. While we cannot give a full account just yet, here are some of the main priorities:

- Most people are in favour of some new housing and development in the village, particularly if it is well designed and affordable, but there is less support for developing the larger sites which have been put forward.
- A footpath along the south bank of the River Tyne
- · A nature reserve at the former Merryshields Quarry
- · A neighbourhood warden or community police officer
- A return of the Village Show
- If the existing school continues in its current form, ensuring
 it could cope with future demand and new technology. If a
 new school is proposed, including an indoor sports hall in its
 design, for community use
- A running track at the sports fields
- Consulting young people about the type of facilities they want in the village
- · Opening up the old station yard for extra parking space
- · Developing the site next to the Branch End petrol station
- · Better train and bus services in the evenings and at weekends
- A combination of lifetime homes and care homes for older and infirm people
- More adult learning opportunities in the village
- A bigger role for the Parish Council in developing land and projects for community benefit

33 residents also expressed an interest in volunteering to assist clubs and sports facilities.

All the information given in the doorstep inquiry, along with what we gathered from the events in July, will form the basis of the Parish Plan and the main issues we need to address over the next 10 to 15 years. We intend to present the draft plan to the Parish Council at its meeting on 5th January 2009, and will be holding a public "feedback event" for residents early in the New Year.

In 2009 the event might be part of SICA's golden jubilee celebration. However, creating such an event would be an enormous (and expensive) undertaking and would require the support of all organisations in Stocksfield and the active participation of a large number of residents.

We are now at the stage where we need to gauge what the public support for such an event might be and to this end plan to hold a **public meeting** at SICA on **Monday 12th January 2009** at 7.30 p.m. It must be stressed that if there is insufficient interest and support for the idea then the proposal will go no further.
