Annual Parish Meeting 2011 – Focus on Young People

Thank you to everyone who came along to the Annual Parish Meeting on 18th April, when our main focus of the evening was on young people. We heard about all of the sporting activities that are currently available to young residents, such as cricket, football, rugby, netball, tennis, golf, badminton and running - over 16s only at present - and found out more about the Cubs, Scouts, Brownies and the newly re-opened Guides.

In the questions and discussion session that followed, Helen Morris invited interested young people and adults to join Stocksfield Players, our resident amateur dramatics group. Chris Pentney talked about the musical activities that Folkworks - based at The Sage, Gateshead - have organised in the village, and told us that Stocksfield Stompers, the local young people's fiddle band, would welcome new members. The new Senior Area Youth Worker, Ashley Brown, described the kind of support that he and his colleagues can offer to young people's groups in the area. The young people who attended the meeting came up with suggestions for two new groups that they would like to see - a snooker club, and a cycling club. Parish Councillors also talked about the possibility of organising free taster sessions in, for example, Zumba or modern dance.

Following the main discussion item, those present were offered the opportunity to comment on and ask questions about the reports from the Parish Council, the Parish Council draft accounts for 2010/11, and a report from County Councillor Anne Dale. They were also updated on the proposal to set up a Community Development Trust in Stocksfield, and informed that the Parish Council was exploring the possibility of nominating both Branch End Play Area and the Sportsfields for the Queen Elizabeth II Fields Challenge.

The Parish Council is now working on the ideas that came up during the meeting, and looking at ways of consulting more Stocksfield young people about the activities they would like in the village. Parking problems persist at Sportsfield

In the last edition of **NE43 News** we reminded readers that parking cars on pavements causes serious problems for the disabled and those with pushchairs. It is also an offence, but one frequently committed on the Main Road near the Sportsfields. We want to warn readers that the Police may soon issue fixed penalty notices to those obstructing the pavement in this area. The road is wide enough for parking.

We are working to provide additional spaces on the Sportsfields, but in the meantime please park - and ask visiting teams to park - on the road, not the pavement.

Pollution hazard for Stocksfield rivers

Officers from the Environment Agency recently carried out an inspection of the river and stream banks in Stocksfield. They discovered that waste and refuse material had been left on the banks of Stocksfield Burn.

This can cause a number of problems. Garden waste may wash into the watercourse and increase both the risk of flooding to properties bordering the burn and reduce oxygen levels in the water. Persistent tipping of waste onto the river bank may also kill off the vegetation that helps hold the banks in place, which may result in erosion.

It is illegal to leave goods or refuse on river banks and the Environment Agency is closely monitoring the situation; offenders run the risk of being fined or even receiving a custodial sentence.

Blockages or refuse on the river bank can be reported to the Environment Agency by calling the 24 hour Incident Hotline on **0800 80 70 60**.

Residents were concerned recently about the proposed development at Burnside, when the owner lodged an appeal against the County Council's refusal of planning permission for 4 new houses and a new access road.

The Parish Council had objected to the application on the grounds of flood risk, over development, and the nature of the proposed new road, and these objections were explained to the Inspector conducting the appeal hearing. We now hear that the appeal has been withdrawn; the owner is of course entitled to submit a new planning application.

The weight of public opposition to the earlier plan only became apparent at a late stage, so we would like to remind residents that the Parish Council always welcomes residents' views about planning applications as soon as they are advertised, which is usually on nearby lamp posts, fences, etc. Plans can be seen on the County Council website, or at Hadrian House in Hexham.

Why am I paying more to the Parish Council this year?

If you have looked at the small print, you may have noticed that this year the Parish Council set a considerably increased 'precept', that portion of your Council Tax which the County hands directly to the Parish Council for local expenditure. This was mainly because during last Autumn. parishes had been led to believe that from April 2011 they would have to pay for some additional services, such as litter-clearing, grass cutting, and the maintenance of bus shelters. This was still the position when we had to notify the County Council of the funds we would require for the next financial year, so we increased our budget to provide for this.

However, there was such disarray throughout Northumberland that the County Council eventually agreed to continue providing services at the 2010-11 level throughout the current year. Discussions during May with the County Council have been helpful, and it now seems that our costs will not rise as steeply as we feared. The Parish Council would like to reassure all residents that your money will NOT be wasted in any way, and any surplus will be carried forward for 2012-2013.

Like government at all levels, we are held accountable for achieving best value for those who elect us. The Parish Council's accounts are always available for inspection, both on the website and by arrangement with the Clerk; residents are also welcome to come to the monthly meeting and ask questions. The accounts for 2010-11 have now been checked by the internal auditor and are available for inspection.

Broomley School at Ford Castle

A group of 40 pupils from Whittonstall and Broomley First Schools had an exciting time staying in the beautiful Ford Castle in north Northumberland on a residential outdoor activity break. During the visit they explored Holy Island, took a boat trip out to The Farne Islands and visited the Honey Farm as well as experiencing lots of problem solving activities and exploring round the castle and grounds. Despite lots of stories about the castle's ghosts, none actually materialised but a visit to the castle's dungeon did raise some goose bumps!



A Vision for Stocksfield

The Development Trust Steering group has decided to look again at the various projects identified in the Stocksfield Parish Plan which was written in 2009. The group wants to review the plan with perhaps further consultation with residents.

As a first step the group took part in a 'Visioning Session' run by advisers from Social Enterprise Northumberland. The Steering Group were asked to come up with ideas for the creation of a new

village centre, together with a structure for implementing the scheme. They were also asked for ideas for other activities, possibly smaller or more easily achieved, which the Steering Group could then investigate.

A full report on this session has been produced and will provide the basis for further discussion. The steering group has no monopoly on good ideas and would be very pleased to hear from any resident with ideas for improving our village. Please call Pete Duncan, **01661 843643**.

Stocksfield River Watch Group

The River Watch group had an outdoor meeting on Tuesday 24th May when the four members who carry out monthly 'River fly data collection' provided a demonstration for the rest of the group. This was done on Stocksfield Burn.

Following this they moved upstream to identify patches of Himalayan balsam which need removing and to locate the

farthest point upstream where the balsam is growing. A series of 'Balsam Bashing' evenings are now planned for the next two months so that we can prevent this invasive plant taking over the banks of Stocksfield Burn.

Hedge Cutting

It is coming up to that time again! Can we urge residents to cut their hedges back hard, so that the pavements and footpaths are left wide enough for pedestrians, parents with buggies, and those with electric scooters or wheelchairs to use the pavements in safety and comfort.

Flooding on Ridley Mill Road

We thought that this problem had been solved, but the rain of the second week of May proved that sewage was still leaking onto Ridley Mill Road. The Parish Council is again in discussion with the Environment Agency and Northumbrian Water and is pressing for an urgent solution to the problem.

Keep Stocksfield Tidy

Many thanks to those of you took part in our Spring Clean week, and specially to the Cubs and Scouts for their litter pick in May; they collected seven bags of rubbish in one evening.

Hanging Baskets

The Parish Council has provided 24 hanging baskets this year. We are particularly grateful to those volunteers who planted and cared for them before they were distributed, and to those who will care for them over the summer.

Parish Office

The Parish Council has agreed to set up a dedicated parish office, which will be located at the Community Centre from September. The Parish Office will provide a 'home' for the parish clerk, create space for small meetings, and give more storage space for all the files and documents that have to be kept for many years.

Bonfires

We occasionally get complaints about bonfires. Please could you think about the impact on your neighbours when siting and lighting bonfires, bearing in mind the wind direction and the fact that smoke and ash can spoil other residents' enjoyment of their gardens. Thank you.

If you see suspicious vehicles which you think might be involved in fly tipping, please take the registration number and report it to the police.


Stocksfield Cricket Club
