#### New Ridley, what's in a name?

It may be true to say that the decision to grant planning permission for the development of 16 houses at New Ridley did not meet with unanimous local approval but the building work is due to commence this year. The precise date is still not known due to a delay in re-routing the overhead electricity cables, although a section of hedgerow will be taken out to allow access and suitable visibility splays.

Two Castles Housing Association have approached the Parish Council for suggestions about the name of the new housing. The Parish Council will make a proposal but wants to ensure that local residents have their say.

Shirley Hall, who lives in New Ridley, has researched much of the history of the village. One of the oldest names to be associated with the village is the Stobart family. 'The Cottage' is the oldest of the existing houses in the village and it is likely that it was once in the ownership of the Stobarts. Charles Stobart owned much of the land around the village and lived at the Dr Syntax for many years. The field to the west of the Grove was known as Stobart's field, some say there are those around who are old enough to remember! One suggestion is that the name of the new houses should reflect this existing name. If you have any ideas or want to support this suggestion, the Parish Council would love to know. Please contact the clerk with your suggestions and the rationale as soon as possible and before the end of April.

## Ask the Police and Crime Commissioner

At the annual Parish Meeting

Vera Baird, the Police and Crime Commissioner for Northumbria, will be addressing the Annual Parish Meeting this year about the issues that face policing locally and across Northumbria. She will be accompanied by the Chief Constable of Northumbria Police, Sue Sim. It all starts at 7.30pm on Monday 20th April at the Community Centre.

The Parish Council are delighted that Ms Baird has accepted the invitation to speak at the meeting and there will be an opportunity for those present to ask questions. There is no doubt that these are challenging times for all our public services. However the proposed closure of Prudhoe Police Station and the removal of the local base for response officers come at a time when the perceptions of crime within Stocksfield are increasing, irrespective of its reported level.

The meeting is also an opportunity to hear about the work of the Parish Council during the last twelve months. The annual reports, accounts and provisional budget will be available on the Council's website during week commencing 6 April 2015.



## **Local Lad's**ATLANTIC ROW

The Scout Group sends a very big thank you to everyone who contributed to Stephen Harpin's epic row across the Atlantic Ocean. in aid of the Scout Hut Fund, which to date has raised the magnificent sum of £10,091, with a number of very generous donations. It proved to be a tough challenge due to the atrocious weather, beginning with the sea sickness – simultaneously rowing and throwing up over the side and coping with the 40 foot waves. They slept, in shifts, in coffin-like bays under the rowers, acting as ballast to ensure that the boat remained upright! The lack of air, coupled with the intense heat, made it feel like sleeping in an oven. The other great difficulty was that it was incredibly painful to sit and row with pressure sores washed with salt water!

## **Community** Defibrillators

Most will have seen the news that the Parish's two Community Public Access Defibrillators (PAD) have been fitted and are now operational with the Ambulance Service. They are located at the Cricket Club (on the front of the pavilion facing west) and at the Golf Club (on the front of the clubhouse facing the road). The cabinets are green and a green light above them illuminates after dusk to identify their location.

If someone is not breathing normally and is not moving or responding to you after an accident, the most important thing to do is to call 999 for an ambulance. Then, if you can, start CPR (or cardiopulmonary resuscitation) straight away. The ambulance service will, if necessary, tell you the location of the closest PAD and give you a code to open the cabinet. Do not stop CPR to get the PAD - send someone else. If there is nobody else, keep doing CPR. The PADs are automatic and you just need to follow the instructions.

The pace was relentless and the only respite they allowed themselves was a 30-minute swim on Christmas Day. On five of the days, in spite of rowing frantically, they finished closer to the start than they were at the beginning of the day, which made it impossible to break the world record. However, the Ocean Rowing Society confirmed that they were within the fastest 15 crossings and broke the 24-hour distance-speed world record, rowing 103 nautical miles (119.56 miles) in one day. The boat, the Toby Wallace, is now the most successful ocean-rowing vessel in history with four under 40 day crossings!

Despite the challenges and problems with the weather, Stephen, pictured on the left with his crew, says that he has had the experience of a lifetime, including seeing the boat surrounded by dolphins diving and jumping - and that it was amazing being in the sea at night with wonderful sunsets and sunrises.

## **CLOSURE** of **Stocksfield** Playgroup

Stocksfield Playgroup has operated at the Community Centre since 1968, and for many years was run independently of the Community Association, by a committee of parents. At some point, when it became difficult to find parents able and willing to run Playgroup, responsibility was transferred to the then SICA Management Committee. This was a most unusual development since the Community Association's role is to provide facilities not organise regular weekly activities. However, in reality Playgroup was managed by its leaders whose salaries were paid by the Community Association. A rota of parents willing to stay and support the leaders continued to operate - though persuading parents to go on the rota became more difficult as very often parents were working.

Playgroup in those days took children just before they were three until they went to Broomley First School so that numbers were always high – and there was often a waiting list to start. This changed significantly when Broomley Pre-school opened, and in order to remain open Playgroup admitted children from age two years. This had a major impact on costs, as the adult/child ratio for children below 3 years is 1:4; at 3 years or over it becomes 1:8. By this time Playgroup was 'Ofsted Registered' and even those parents willing to join a rota could not be counted in the adult/child ratio.

Other costs increased as, for example, IT equipment became essential and charges for CRB (now DBS) checks and specialist insurance had to be met. Ofsted rules on management have resulted in at least one member of the Community Association board becoming trained

in Early Years procedures which includes staff appraisal, and regularly updating policies and procedures.

Despite these challenges the Community Association board – all of whom are volunteers whose primary role is maintaining and improving the Community Centre- has continued to meet the changing challenges of supporting Playgroup. Playgroup is certainly better managed than it was when it was rated 'Good' at its last Ofsted inspection. The two leaders provide outstanding education and care in ideal surroundings, but with alternative all-day provision elsewhere in the village and all children over 3 years of age catered for at Broomley Pre-school, it is clear there is insufficient local demand to support a Playgroup of this type.

Given the disastrous state of its finances the board had little alternative but to close Playgroup, though it did consider trying to continue until the end of the school year because of concerns for the small number of families affected by closure. However, the fact that our Playgroup leader will be leaving at the end of this term made this impossible as it would be irresponsible to attempt to appoint a new leader given the numbers attending and the precarious state of Playgroup's finances.

So, sadly, Stocksfield Playgroup's final session will be on Thursday 26th March 2015. It has functioned for almost 47 years and the Community Association board can understand and sympathise with concerns within the community at its closure. The committed leaders and volunteers have tried really hard to maintain this facility, and it is worth bearing in mind that all but one of the other 'Sections' operating back in 1968 are long since gone. Unfortunately, Stocksfield Playgroup's demise is very obviously the result of changing child care needs.

#### New Grant Award Policy

The Parish Council has agreed a new policy that governs the awards of grants from I April onwards. In summary, the process differs between grant applications up to £500 and those over £500. If you are considering applying for a grant in the financial year 2015/16 which exceeds £500, you must apply before 31 May 2015. Grant applications up to £500 during 2015 must be made either by 31 May or by 30 September 2015.

For the financial year 2016/17, grant applications over £500 must be made before I October 2015 in order that the Parish Council can consider the applications during its budget setting process. Full details of the new policy can be found on the Council's website, together with the application form which must be completed in all cases. The requirements that organisations must satisfy and the application form vary depending on the amount applied for. You can also find other existing Council policies published on the website.
