Community Speed Watch

Speeding vehicles remain a constant concern for many residents and the local neighbourhood policing team continues to work to address the issue by deploying speed camera vans and handheld devices in the area. The police have a wide range of responsibilities and in recognition of the fact that the community will not accept the dangers posed by speeding vehicles, trained volunteers also work alongside the police to record details of speeding vehicles using measuring equipment. A recent issue of NE43 News featured an article on Community Speed Watch - those found speeding are warned by letter and, if necessary, visited by police. Whilst these efforts to monitor speed of vehicles in critical areas will continue, we must all play our part - over 10% of vehicles found speeding in Stocksfield recently were being driven by Stocksfield residents and nearly 40% were from the surrounding areas.

Northumbria Police is currently looking to recruit more volunteers in Stocksfield to assist in Speed Watch. The message is clear - Stocksfield will not tolerate speeding vehicles: they are a danger to all road users and affect the quality of life of residents. With walks from half a mile to twelve miles plus long, and a note of suitability for pushchairs and wheelchairs, everyone can find a walk to enjoy.

Police and Crime Commissioner in Stocksfield

Over 30 residents heard Vera Baird, the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) for Northumbria, address the Annual Parish Meeting on 20 April and describe her role and the issues facing Northumbria Police. She explained the police priority setting process and the five existing priorities:

- Putting Victims at the heart of the Criminal Justice System
- Tackling Antisocial Behaviour
- Sexual and Domestic Abuse
- Cutting Crime
- Community Confidence

Ms Baird spoke about two additional areas of responsibility that had been given to PCCs - supporting victims and restorative justice. The significant budget reductions were highlighted and the commitment to retain front line staff. Close to home, this will eventually result in the closure of Prudhoe Police Station. Response officers are already based at Hexham with no reduction in response times but the new local base for neighbourhood officers has not been identified.

Accompanied by the local neighbourhood policing inspector, Julie Cole and the chief inspector for communities in Northumberland and North Tyneside, Nicola Musgrove, Ms Baird took a range of questions from the audience. The key message from the police is that, irrespective of police numbers, local residents know their area best. Local residents see when things out of the ordinary happen and the police encourage reports of suspicious activity. Residents should not be concerned about

fears of wasting police time - it's important to make the call rather than regret it later.

As a result of the meeting, the Parish Council wants to look again at the potential for Neighbourhood Watch in Stocksfield and, if there is sufficient interest, will arrange a meeting of residents and police. If you want to arrange a scheme where you live, please get in touch with the Clerk. Neighbourhood Watch is not simply about erecting signs warning off potential offenders, it is about a network of active residents who put theory

into practice by contacting the police when things out of the ordinary happen and circulating key information from the police to local people.

SCATA Bungalow at Branch End nearing completion



As most people now know, Stocksfield Community Association Trading Arm's (SCATA) affordable housing scheme at Guessburn is now complete and fully occupied. The two bedroom bungalow at Branch End, on the site of the former public toilets, is still under construction, due to delays in re-routing electricity cables. It is expected to be completed later in the summer.

The bungalow, which is very close to all the local services at Branch End, will be rented to a couple who are over 55 years old and have a local connection to Stocksfield.

NEW BRIDLEWAY at Hindley

A new bridleway has been established along the existing public footpath that connects New Ridley and Hindley, passing Redshawfoot and then crossing Stocksfield Burn. Whilst this means that cyclists and horse riders are now allowed to use the route alongside walkers, Northumberland County Council is looking at appropriate Diversion Orders near Hindley which are necessary to make the route fully accessible for horse riders. BYWELL Arts Festival

The ancient Bywell churches of St.Peter's and St.Andrew's once again provide the venue for this popular annual exhibition of paintings and other craftworks by local artists and designers. St Andrew's Church, now in the care of the Churches Conservation Trust, is rarely open to visitors and well worth a visit in its own right.

Well established as an exhibition for original works, the Festival last year introduced the sale of numbered prints, which proved to be very successful, so some of the artists will be offering prints for sale this year, creating a more affordable option and appeal to a wider range of buyers.

In addition to the visual art on display, there will be musical entertainment during the weekend, the highlight of which is the Saturday night concert in St Peter's Church with Prudhoe Community Choir and soloists. In what promises to be a very enjoyable concert, the varied programme will include favourites from shows such as Les Miserables and Joseph and his Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat. Wine and other refreshments will be available in the interval.

The **cutting 'edge** debate

It's that time of year when hedges and trees can grow out of control. Please don't let your hedge grow beyond the boundary of your land where it can obstruct a footpath, highway or other public area. Please be aware that the Parish . Council will not undertake any work on privately owned hedges (that's not what the precept is for). Instead where landowners fail to keep hedges in check, Northumberland County Council will be informed to commence enforcement action.

Defibrillator training

For those who are interested in finding out more about using one of the Public Access Defibrillators (PAD), the Parish Council is arranging a further familiarisation event which will be held at the Golf Club. The date, probably in August or September, is not known but will be published on the Council's website. So keep checking. Remember that PADs are available at locations across the country, from shopping centres to small villages so it may not be at home when the need to use one arises.

Litter isn't a significant problem in most of the area but there is always room for improvement. Northumberland County Council's Litter Campaign launched in early May focuses on raising public awareness of the cost to the environment and to the Council. Remember that you can report offenders you see dropping litter by completing the form on the Parish Council's website www.stocksfieldpc.org.uk/publicinfo.php and forwarding it to the County Council's Environment Enforcement Officer. This includes litter thrown from vehicles, but you need to record as much information as possible to help the County Council to take action.



New Ridley development

The new housing development at New Ridley will be known as Stobarts Field, reflecting the local name of the field on which the houses are to be built. The Parish Council considered a number of suggestions and recommended the name which dates back to the 19th Century. Two Castles Housing Association supported the proposal and Northumberland County Council has confirmed its adoption. It already has its own postcode. Whilst retaining one aspect of tradition, another falls by the wayside - apostrophes, it seems, are doomed.

100s taste history

of Minsteracres as it launches future plans

Hundreds of people took the chance to visit Minsteracres at its recent open house event as the retreat centre near Consett launched plans to modernise its retreat house accommodation. Among the visitors were County Durham men who as teenagers joined hundreds of volunteers from the local steel and building industries to create the current guest building.

The retreat house at Minsteracres was converted from a former stable block by a workforce of tradesmen and labourers who gave up their spare time after shifts at steel mills and on building sites. That was nearly 50 years ago. Now the community is planning a £500,000 refurbishment of the retreat house to install a lift, add extra bathrooms and carry out further modernisation to cater for the growing numbers of people seeking the serenity Minsteracres provides.

Half a century ago, mini buses brought the volunteers to the site from St Patrick's in Consett after Sunday mass, some coming straight off night shifts. The men were often accompanied by their teenage sons.

Frank McDonald, 68, from Shotley Bridge, was inspired to become a joiner and eventually found his own business after helping his carpenter uncle on the building conversion.

Frank says, "My uncle Lawrence was a joiner by trade and a site agent and I came up here with him as a youngster. I worked on it right through from the beginning to the end. The labourers were mainly people from the Consett area, many from the building industry as well as steel works - bricklayers, pipe fitters, painters and decorators, general workmen.

"There was a big crowd of youngsters. We used to stay. It was fantastic. Coming up here helped me choose what I wanted to do as a trade. It got me in to being a joiner.

"Somebody was talking about the stairs in the retreat house just now. I helped to build them!"

Mark McNally from Ebchester was another visitor with memories of the 1960s, "I used to serve on the altar here as a child. My dad Jack McNally worked in the steel works as a labourer.

"If he worked night shift he finished at 6am. There was usually a mini bus to pick up the men and bring them back. The priests gave them breakfast and they worked for three or four hours and then had to get back to get some sleep before they started their next shifts.

"The steel works were a great source of labour. Working here was an extension of their faith for the men." he adds.

Another visitor Chris Hegarty remembers, "On many occasions my dad came up after working night shift at the steel works. On occasions as a young teenager I would come up here with him helping with odd jobs like pushing wheel barrows. Or we would spend time outdoors wandering about. The men would get their lunch and a bottle of beer with it."

Chris's wife Barbara adds,"My dad had a lot to do with the fund raising. He worked for the breweries. He was a bit of a cook - they had these great big summer fayres - and my dad was always involved in that.

"My sister got married here. We had her reception in the retreat house, even though it was still a building site - one part had been done but the other one hadn't."

Nuala O'Brien, communications manager at Minsteracres, says, "It was great to meet some of the people who helped with the original conversion back in the '60s. We're trying to collect their stories and pictures and contrast what they did back then to what we're doing now."
