Amazon Rowers in the *RECORD BOOK*



Editor - it appears that many residents may not have received a letter about this herculean effort (or, like the Ed, mistook it for junk mail!) so the story is being included in this issue of NE43 News.

Stephen Harpin, the intrepid adventurer, has been rowing again, this time in a team of five, the whole length of the navigable Amazon River - a total of 2,077 miles, from Nauta in Peru to Macapa in Brazil. The real challenge was rowing in intense heat of 85 degrees F and over 90% humidity whilst interrupted by violent storms and excessive winds. Rowing 24 hours a day, in 2-hour shifts, there were severe navigation difficulties: running aground in the first half of the journey where the river was about 300 yards wide; and later where the river was 2 miles wide and very busy, avoiding 240-metre wide tankers travelling at 20 knots. Or perhaps more accurately, ensuring via their radio that, as a small rowing boat restricted in their ability to manoeuvre, they had been seen!

So what were the highlights?

• Four approaches at gunpoint, to examine their papers and search their boat for drugs and weapons, initially by aggressive Colombian militia and later, Brazilian militia who always turned out friendly. On one occasion the militia cooked them a meal, which made them ill for two days! What a strain on their only bucket!

Annual Parish Meeting

The Parish Council holds an Annual Parish Meeting and this year's meeting will be held at 7.30pm on Monday 18 April at Stocksfield Community Centre. The Council usually invites a speaker to address the meeting on matters of interest to the local community and this year is delighted to welcome Dr Colin Doig from the Northumbria Healthcare NHS Trust. Colin is a consultant cardiologist and the Director for Clinical Support and Cancer Services Business Unit. He will talk about the most recent changes to emergency care and explain how they have affected Hexham hospital and the other hospitals in the area. The meeting also gives residents an opportunity to hear and ask questions about the work of the Parish Council over the previous 12 months and to raise any issues of concern or interest. Make sure you put the date in your diary.

- Beating the only one other boat to have rowed the whole river, by 4 days - and a future entry in the Guinness Book of Records!



The team were completely unsupported and self-financed, with the aim of raising funds for worthwhile charities and again Stephen is being sponsored to help raise funds for a replacement Scout hut. The roof of the present hut has had to be covered

Shelter

Proving that the Parish Council does respond to the ideas and needs of residents, in January the new bus shelter was installed on the A695 at Branch End. Passengers waiting for a bus in either direction now have the benefit of shelter from the wind and rain. It sits so unobtrusively at the side of the road that many have not even noticed its arrival and takes its place alongside the other shelters in the village which are all owned and maintained by the Parish Council. Just remember you'll need to keep a lookout for the bus and when you see it, walk the 15 or so metres down the road to the bus stop.

Two new parish councillors (both pictured) have been co-opted onto the Council at recent meetings. Pete Newman, an Operations Manager for a national forestry company, attended his first meeting in February. He has lived in Stocksfield for 15 years and has coached Stocksfield under 10s and 11s boys' football teams until 2012. At the March meeting of the Parish Council, Judith Furniss was also co-opted onto the Council and will attend her first meeting as a councillor in April. Judith has lived in New Ridley for 29 years and previously worked within nursing and education. She has been active locally as a volunteer in schools and adult education centres and is secretary of Prudhoe Castle Bowling Club.

Maggi Hunt, the Council's Chair, said, "In the shadow of next year's county and parish elections, it's great to see new residents coming forward and wanting to make a contribution towards the community." There is now one remaining vacancy and if anyone wants further information about the role of a parish councillor, please contact the clerk.

Who you gonna call?

What do you do when you see something that needs putting right? Whether it is overflowing litter bins, fly tipped rubbish, damaged pavements or a pothole, Northumberland County Council is very efficient at responding to issues that are reported either using its online system or by telephone. Accessible from the home page of the County Council's website www.northumberland.gov.uk, all manner of things can be quickly reported, from street lighting faults, dog waste and missed bin collections to problems with trees. Telephone reports can be made on 01661 520005.

The County Council also has ultimate responsibility for the network of public footpaths that cross the countryside and link areas within the village. However the Parish Council has, with funding from the County Council, taken over the general maintenance of the public footpaths within the village (not pavements beside the road though). Problems affecting these public footpaths can be directed to the Parish Council in the first instance, either by telephone or preferably by email. The contact details are on the last page.

Spotlight on:

The Rights of Way and Environment Advisory Group

The Parish Council is fortunate to have a long established group working to promote the rights of way, footpaths and general environment within Broomley and Stocksfield. The group, usually referred to as ROWE, is chaired by a Parish Councillor and is made up of local volunteers and a number of officers from County based organisations, such as the County Council's Area Countryside Officer. Without letting its members' egos inflate too much, the set-up here in Stocksfield is promoted by the County Council as best practice and is recognised for getting things done. Read on to uncover its main areas of activity and hopefully feel inspired.

Friends of Stocksfield Station -

are a group of volunteers (some pictured) who have been working to improve the area around the car park at Stocksfield station. The gravel area around the bollards has had fresh gravel laid and is kept weed free by regular spraying during the growing season.

The area adjacent to the ramp leading up to the platform (also pictured) is gradually being cultivated with a mixture of bulbs, shrubs, annual, perennial and wild flowers.



Prudhoe and Stocksfield Circular Walk -



is currently under development by members of the group and Prudhoe Pathforce, and will supplement new footpaths already created through their combined efforts. When the work is completed, leaflets will be available illustrating the walk and the information will also be accessible on the Parish Council's website. The walk, which will be about eight miles long in total, can also be

completed in two sections. Starting at Stocksfield Station, passing the new sculptured bench (pictured) located at the end of Guessburn, ascending to New Ridley, Mickley Grange farm, High Mickley and then descending to Tyne Valley Garden Centre in Mickley, where the bus can take walkers back to Stocksfield. Alternatively, walkers can start at the garden centre and walk down to Eltringham, along the river bank to Merryshields and then on to Stocksfield station to catch the bus back to Mickley. To facilitate the walk, Northumberland County Council is making improvements to the footpaths and signage along the route.



Invasive Plants -

are a serious threat to the local environment. Himalayan Balsam (pictured above) is a non-native plant growing up to 2m tall, often along river and stream banks. It shades out the native plants and as it's an annual it then leaves the banks bare and vulnerable to erosion in winter. You may have seen large areas on the banks of the Tyne. Volunteers from the group have been hand pulling the plants each summer along the Stocksfield burn to try and keep our native plants flourishing there. If you see any, they are easy to pull out by the root and squash, then leave on site to die. If the seeds ripen each plant can produce 800 seeds which are then spread up to 7m by explosion!

Members of the group also tackle Japanese Knotweed, a plant native to East Asia, and one of the world's worst invasive species. With a stem similar to bamboo, it impacts seriously on biodiversity and flood management and can damage property. It is illegal to grow. Training is required to ensure that the plant is not further distributed whilst being destroyed.

River Watch -

involves a variety of activity around the natural watercourses in the village. A monthly monitoring of river fly larvae in Stocksfield burn continues and the number of volunteers able to assist has grown. In addition to the monthly kick testing (essentially disturbing the bed of the burn, then examining what has been disturbed to identify the species present), there is also an electro-fishing survey carried out by trained members of the group and volunteers in conjunction with the Tyne Rivers Trust. This is of particular interest, as the group was instrumental in installing the fish easement at the lower ford to allow migratory fish to reach potentially suitable spawning areas above both fords.

Monitoring Footpaths and Bridleways -

is an important aspect of the ROWE group whose members are often active walkers (some more than others) and are in regular contact with the county Area Countryside Officer, identifying the need for maintenance of a path or stiles for example.

Residents of Stocksfield, many without knowing it, are indebted to the group for their contribution to keeping the village and surrounding countryside to the standard we see and enjoy. They complement the work of the Parish Groundsman whose contract covers most of the planted areas around the village and the play areas. The ROWE group is always in need of volunteers, anyone who would like to help with balsam bashing in particular, or even less active members who can use their expertise to assist the group. Flooding update

December and January saw extensive flood damage to buildings, roads, bridges, culverts, public rights of way and drainage including several large landslips. The County Council's damage priorities include Ovingham Bridge and the Bywell Road and it has put a £24 million bid into the Department for Transport for repairs to infrastructure.

Locally there was flooding in Riding Mill in December when three houses were evacuated. There was flood damage to some houses in Stocksfield in January and one house was evacuated in Mickley.

Cllr Dale is working with those residents affected and the County Council to ensure that applications for grants are lodged. Work continues with the Environment Agency, Northumbrian Water and the County Council's Highways officers to investigate all elements of flooding to ensure that preventative measures are put in place.

In Stocksfield, old gullies are still being found covered over. Please check around your property, for example under your hedgerows, and let Cllr Dale know if you find any hidden gullies. It is vital that all gullies are kept clear to prevent future flooding. Cllr Dale is working with the County Council to review the risk based service for gulley clearance in the area.

The commitment of the County Council's Local Services team and the Fire Brigade was outstanding and was recognised by the Parish Council at their February meeting. Renewable Energy at the Community Centre

The Community Association Board is delighted to have secured a grant of £5000 from the County Durham Community Foundation (EDF Renewables Fund) to fit solar panels on to the roof of the hall. The Board has committed a similar sum of money so that a 32 panel 8kW system has now been installed. The system includes a device which will increase the efficiency of the energy conversion by approximately 20%. Despite the recent massive cut in the Feed in Tariff this will still prove both a good long term investment and reduce our carbon footprint as we switch to using renewable energy.

Whittonstall Action Group and future opencast mining proposals

Although UK Coal has withdrawn its planning application, Whittonstall Action Group (WAG), nonetheless remains vigilant and ready to take up cudgels against any future planning applications for the mining of coal in and around Whittonstall.

In late November 2015, WAG submitted a response to the draft Northumberland County Council Local Plan: Core Strategy. As part of its response, WAG argued the need for greater scrutiny and tighter regulatory controls in respect of restoration bonds, and a more effective policing of restoration processes. WAG members remain in regular contact with each other ready to launch, if necessary, a vigorous campaign against any future coal mining proposals.

Are you over sixty years of age?

Do you know what benefits you can get? Attendance Allowance, Personal Independence Payment, Housing Benefit and Council Tax

Reduction, Pension Credit etc. We can help you find out and help you apply.

Which Benefit?

Attendance Allowance is for people who are 65 or over and need help with personal care or supervision to keep them safe. There are two rates; £82.30 per week for people who need help day and night or £55.10 for people who need help either day or night.

Personal Independence Payment is for people under 65 who need help looking after themselves or who find it difficult to walk or get around. It is paid at a range of rates from £21.80 to £139.75 weekly.

Carer's Allowance is for people who care (for 35 hours or more per week) for someone who gets Attendance Allowance or certain components of Personal Independence Payment. Carer's allowance is paid at the rate of £62.10 per week.

Pension Credit is for people who are over 60 and on a low income. It makes their weekly income up to £151.20 for a single person and £230.85 for a couple (but this can be more in certain circumstances). Savings don't always prevent you from getting the benefit, but it may affect the amount you can receive. There may be an extra amount for those 65 or over with modest savings or income.

Housing Benefit helps people pay their rent and Council Tax Reduction helps people pay their Council Tax.

Never assume you are not entitled to benefit! We can help you find out what you are entitled to. Amounts are correct as at March 2016.

Got no central heating?

Government funding is available to install central heating systems into qualifying properties. This may be a once in a lifetime opportunity for qualifying residents. If the funds are not used they will go back to Central Government. Community Action is working with Warm Up North to identify residents who may qualify. More details are given below along with contact details.

CENTRAL HEATING FUND

Warm Up North, a partnership between nine North East local authorities and British Gas, has been awarded government funding to install free central heating systems into qualifying properties in the North East of England.

You may qualify for free central heating if:

- You are a private homeowner, or rent your home from a private landlord
- You live in one of the nine Warm Up North areas (including Northumberland)
- Your home does not have, and never has had, a central heating system or you have solid fuel central heating which does not cover all the rooms in your house and
- Installing a new central heating system will improve the energy rating of your house.

If you think you may be eligible for help under this scheme you can contact Warm Up North to arrange for an energy assessor to come out and survey your home, check eligibility and work out the best type of heating system for your property. The surveyor will then discuss these options in detail with you and explain what system could be installed.
