Planning the future of Broomley and Stocksfield

### Chairman's Annual Report April 2016 - March 2017

In a year of unforeseen national and international change, the Parish Council has continued its work on maintaining and improving facilities in the village and surrounding areas, with a focus on ensuring that our residents can enjoy a beautiful, safe, clean and pleasant environment.



This year has seen the submission of planning applications for an extended cricket pavilion and changing facilities, along with an extension to the car park, at the sports fields. In tandem with these developments, we are very grateful to Allendale Estates for agreeing to a longer lease on the eastern sports fields which offers us the opportunity to make substantial improvements to the pitches and playing surfaces. We expect these exciting plans to develop during the next year; they have the potential to result in superb, high quality sports facilities right on our doorstep.



Speeding has been a major concern of residents, in particular on the A695 through the village and on New Ridley Road, and the Parish Council has continued to work with partners to address this issue. A traffic survey on the A695, carried out by Northumberland County Council, did not indicate that the recorded speeds were excessive, but the findings of two traffic surveys on New Ridley Road recorded speeds that have resulted in referral to Northumbria Police. This matter is being followed up in partnership with the police. The Parish Council has also cut back undergrowth and some trees along the verge on the north side of New Ridley Road, and is maintaining this area in the hope that, together with the new village gateways, this will have an impact on the speed of vehicles going into New Ridley by giving drivers a clearer impression that they are entering a residential area. We are also promoting Community Speed Watch and considering potential traffic calming measures in conjunction with partners.

# E43 news

During the year, the Parish Council agreed to provide two additional bus shelters so that bus users would have access to a degree of comfort at every bus stop along the A695 through the village. Both of them have now been installed, one at the bus stop opposite Birches Nook Road, and the second at Hall Farm Close.



For the first time, the Parish Council joined Newton and Bywell Parish Council and Allendale Estates to stage November's Fireworks Display at Bywell Showground. The event was a great success, and generated funding which both Parish Councils can donate to charitable causes. These funds are in addition to grants and donations worth over £7000 which the Parish Council made to community groups and organisations.

The Remembrance Day service at the War Memorial in November was led by lay minister Robert Peers, and was again attended by a large number of residents and a contingent of officers from N Battery (The Eagle Troop) 3rd Regiment Royal Horse Artillery, along with the Deputy Lord Lieutenant. We very much appreciate the involvement of our local scouting and guiding groups in what has become a significant event in the village's calendar.

The Rights of Way and Environment Advisory Group has continued to develop its work on our behalf, and its regular electro-fishing surveys indicate a good range of diverse fish in the river. The Group is also working with the Tyne Rivers Trust on a coordinated approach to controlling invasive species on the river bank, and has been instrumental, along with Prudhoe Pathforce, Prudhoe Town Council and Northumberland County Council, in publishing a leaflet giving details of a circular walk around Prudhoe and Stocksfield (available on the Parish Council's website). The Group is chaired by a Parish Councillor, and made up of volunteers and officers of County based organisations, and we are very grateful to them for their time and enthusiasm.



In October, tenants moved into the new houses at Stobarts Field in New Ridley. Although this development was controversial because of its position in the green belt, we welcome our new residents, and hope that they enjoy living here. The Planning Advisory Group has continued to consider planning applications and to comment on pre-

application enquiries, further to changes implemented by the County Council. Although final decisions on planning applications are made by County Councillors, and do not always reflect the views of the Parish Council, the opportunity to offer a local view on planning enquiries at the pre-application stage is one we welcome and take very seriously.

Further to our previous work on the development of a Community Flood Plan, we are now involved with partners from further afield in Rainwise, a flood prevention initiative, and in Tyne Valley Flood Action Groups.

Three of our Parish Councillors resigned during the year. John Davison, a councillor of many years' standing, made a valuable contribution to the work of the General Governance Advisory Group; Jim Roy chaired the Rights of Way and Environment Advisory Group; and Pete Newman brought his experience of both environmental work and sports to our deliberations. I would like to extend my thanks to all three of them for their work on behalf of the village and surrounding areas. In February, we were very pleased to welcome Chris Liddle to the Council, and look forward to working with him.

Looking ahead to the coming year, we know that there will be financial challenges for Parish Councils as a consequence of planned reductions to the County Council's funding from central government. We will take every opportunity to establish partnerships with other Parish Councils where appropriate, building on our current experience of a joint arrangement with Riding Mill Parish Council to maintain some of our equipment. We also intend to develop a new Parish Council Plan, based on the concerns and aspirations of our residents.

In conclusion, I would like to pass on a sincere thank you to our Clerk, Nick Spencer, for his efficient management and wise counsel, to our Groundsman, Martin Stewart, for keeping the village and surrounding areas in such excellent condition, and to my fellow Parish Councillors for the experience, good sense and commitment they have shown during the last twelve months.

achieves: 'Hallmark 2'

The board of Stocksfield Community Association is delighted to have achieved Hallmark 2 - less than a year after achieving Hallmark 1. 'Hallmark' is a quality standard set nationally and administered in Northumberland by Community Action Northumberland (CAN) which aims to establish and reward good practice.

Although nineteen halls in Northumberland have achieved Hallmark I, very few have achieved Hallmark 2 - which assesses compliance with a range of legislative issues including health & hygiene, first aid, cleanliness, fire safety, licences and access. Applying to CAN for Hallmark accreditation was anything but stressful and our actual inspection was a real pleasure - with our 'visitors' clearly impressed and very helpful. Inspection was carried out on 3rd April and accreditation lasts for three years.

One of the chief benefits of the process was carrying out an 'Access Audit' which really raised awareness of issues regarding access for some of our users - and not just the obvious ones about disability access. As a result some minor changes have been made and more will follow as access to the premises for those with dementia is improved.

#### Stocksfield Football

It's been another brilliant year for Stocksfield Football Club which has seen 175 players aged from 4 to 45 play under the Griffins banner.

Our Saturday soccer sessions (in partnership with NUFC) for 4-7 year olds go from strength to strength and we look forward to welcoming a new group of kids in September.

We also now have a newly formed veterans team who are travelling to London in June to play their second match together.

Alongside that our junior sections have had another strong season with our u12/13/14/15s all either securing promotions, winning leagues or still challenging for titles. All of these teams have been together since u8s which is great to see.

We would again like to thank the players, parents and volunteers who continue to make Stocksfield FC one of the best clubs in the area. Next season looks to be another exciting one and we can't wait to share more news.



#### Where was **Spring?**

The Council would like to think that everyone will have noticed that the spring edition of NE43 News was not published. NE43 News has been published quarterly for many years but last December the Parish Council looked closely at the frequency of publication. The Council decided that the timing of future issues should be driven by the availability of content rather than the angle of the earth's rotation about its axis and the directness of the sun's light. There will always be an issue published in early December and either one or two during the remainder of the year. The timing of the other issues will be flexible as will the size of all editions. The Council will review its decision in time to ensure that NE43 News fully meets its and the community's needs.

# **Branch End Surgery** flu campaign 2017-18

Branch End Surgery will be running its flu campaign from early September 2017. The surgeries will be a mix of walk-in on the day appointments and pre-bookable appointments to suit all patients' needs.

Last year several members of the admin. team were trained to give flu vaccinations and this was received very positively by those patients who were seen by them. The admin. team can sometimes give you a flu vaccination outside of the normal vaccination clinic dates and on a walkin basis, if staffing and room capacity allows.
